Current United Nations Structures in Geographic Information

- UNRCC (UN Regional Cartographic Conferences)
 - UNRCC Asia-Pacific every 3 years, UNRCC Americas every 4 years
- UNGIWG (UN Geographic Information Working Group)
 - a voluntary network of UN professionals working in the fields of cartography and geographic information science
- UNGEGN (UN Group of Experts on Geographical Names)
 - provides technical recommendations on standardizing geographical names at the national and international levels
- UN Cartographic Section/Department of Field Support
 - As part of the Logistics Support Division (LSD) provides logistical support to peacekeeping, peacebuilding and political missions around the world.

UN-GGIM: Established

- The Economic and Social Council of the United Nations (ECOSOC) has recognized the importance of geospatial information in national and global development.
- As a result and following extensive consultation with Member States, the ECOSOC meeting held in July 2011 established the UN Committee of Experts on Global Geospatial Information Management (UN-GGIM).
- ECOSOC encouraged 'Member States to hold regular highlevel, multi-stakeholder discussions on global geospatial information, including through the convening of global forums, with a view to promoting a comprehensive dialogue with all relevant actors and bodies'.

UN-GGIM: A Global Initiative

- An Inter-Governmental mechanism to make joint decisions and set directions on the production and use of geospatial information within national and global policy frameworks
- Working with Governments to improve policy, institutional arrangements, and legal frameworks
- Addressing global issues and contributing collective knowledge as a community with shared interests and concerns
- Developing effective strategies to build geospatial capacity in the developing countries

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First High Level Forum (Oct 2011)

 350 participants from 90 countries, 22 UN representatives, & 37 representatives from international organizations and the private sector

Ministers from Chile, Finland, India, Republic of Korea, Malaysia, Mongolia, Namibia, and Niger provided views, including the value proposition, on the role of geospatial information in national development.





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Outcomes of the HLF



UN-GGIM

- Strong support from the Ministers on UN-GGIM
- The importance of working together across borders
- The importance of collaboration in developing common frameworks, tools and procedures



Outcomes of the HLF

- Relevant international organizations affirmed their commitment
- Recognized the important role of international geospatial information societies and standards setting organizations & welcomed their contributions
- Recognized that the geospatial industry is a key partner in global geospatial information community



UN-GGIM: Vision

• To make accurate and authoritative geospatial information readily available to support national, regional and global development.....







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Four initial critical tasks

- Evolving <u>a shared vision</u> for the future in management of geospatial information nationally and globally
- Evolving <u>an inclusive platform</u> for improving, sharing and disseminating national and global geospatial data
- Evolving <u>a global 'Statement of Ethics'</u> and supporting code of conduct to enhance public trust
- Evolving <u>a mutually beneficial relationship</u> between the Government and the non-Government entities

- Second UN-GGIM High Level Forum: Doha, Qatar February 2013.
- Third Committee of Experts Session: mid-2013.
- ECOSOC requested a comprehensive report for the year 2016 a detailed 5-year progress report.
