Recommendations of the Place Names Committee of Helsinki

- In harmony with the resolution VIII/2
- A five year long waiting period after the individual's death
- Places cannot be named after public or private corporations still in operation
- Commemorative names shall not be gathered in dense groups within an area
- Adopted in 2004

Recommendations of the Institute for the Languages of Finland

- Gives guidance on name planning nationwide
- First guidelines on commemorative naming in 1980's in the journal for the language planning of Finnish named *Kielikello*
- Follows the recommendations of the Place Names Committee of the City of Helsinki

Commemorative naming in practice

- Enquiry concerning naming practises in municipalities in 1999
- 55% of the municipalities have sometimes given place names after living individuals
- Commemorative names are given to commemorate for example local politicians or officials, municipal managers, athlets or entertainers
- Renaming places that have commemorative names is relatively rare


