## Report of the Round Table on Business Survey Frames

### Purpose

To provide a forum for the exchange of views and experiences and the conduct of joint experiments bearing on the development, maintenance and use of sampling frames for business surveys (business registers). The Round Table is an informal body and participation is on a voluntary basis. Participants, however, are required to contribute to the programme of the meeting. The mandate of the Round Table does not emanate from a formal body, but the Round Table could, on the basis of its discussions and/or experiments, make a recommendation to a formal body (e.g., the Statistical Commission) concerning, for example, the consideration/adoption of certain practices or standards.

1986 in Ottawa.
