## **EGRISS – Quick overview**

- Expert Group established by the UN Statistical Commission in 2016, currently completing its third consecutive mandate
- Membership: 61 countries and 38 international/regional organisations
- Focused on promoting and supporting implementation of IRRS & IRIS, IROSS through various channels (see below)
- Complementary resources & technical guidance:
  - o Compilers' Manual
  - <u>E-learning course</u>
  - Recommendations summaries & translations
- <u>Regional workshops</u> & events to facilitate peer-to-peer exchange
- Methodological research (e.g.):
  - Standardizing identification questions for surveys
  - SDG disaggregation/inclusion
- Alignment of other Recommendations & Handbooks (e.g.):
  - International migration
  - P&R for PHC 2030 round





# Need *for* alignment

### **Population sizes**


304 million migrants (2024) **117.3** million forcibly displacement (2023)

**68,3** million IDPs

**43,4** million refugees, asylum seekers and others in need of international protection

4,4 million stateless (2023)



# Linking EGRISS Recommendations to *Migration Statistics*

The revised Recommendations on International Migration and Temporary Mobility are now better aligned to EGRISS recommendations, specifically IRRS and IROSS.








#### IRRS Framework

Comprehensive and agreed upon statistical frameworks for refugees and statelessness helped inform alignment with revised migration recommendations

### **Statistics & indicators**



Importance of disaggregation highlighted by both expert groups:

TF1 Indicators for international migration and temporary mobility incorporated input from IRRS, recommending breakdown by reason for migration and asylum seeker/refugee status across both core and additional proposed indicators.

EGRISS Recommendations identify priority **14 SDG indicators** for disaggregation on forced displacement and statelessness status.

Over half of EGRISS priority SDG indicators are also listed in core overall indicators by Task Force 1 for disaggregation by migratory status and migration-relevant topics:



**4.1.1 (4.6.1)** Proportion of children and young people achieving minimum proficiency in reading and mathematics.



**11.1.1** Proportion of the urban population living in slums, informal settlements, or inadequate housing.



16.9.1 Proportion of children under 5 years of age whose births have been registered with a civil authority.
16.b.1 (10.3.1) Proportion of the population reporting discrimination or harassment based on prohibited grounds under international law in the last year.



**8.3.1** Proportion of informal employment in nonagriculture employment. **8.5.2** Unemployment rate.



**7.1.1** Proportion of the population with access to electricity.

Additional indicators highlighted by both groups (like ones on sanitation-6.1.1/6.2.1, or poverty 1.2.1/10.2.1) would use most of the same inputs to be calculated



#### Overview of EGRISS Recommendation on different traditional sources, links to migration



Population and housing census

For both migration and forced displacement areas, some of the same questions/modules and deliberation of EGRISS recommendations suggest inclusion of reason for migration as a core PHC topic

### Statistical coordination

All recommendations underline the critical importance of effective coordination of statistics and national, regional and global levels.

In practice, progress is tangible whilst recognizing the distinct policy approaches needed:

**National:** Several countries have established statistical coordination mechanisms that combine migration & displacement statistics, especially in Africa.

**Regional**: Several regions have established/are establishing similar platforms:

- **LAC**: CEPAL Working Group on Migration and Displacement Statistics (2024-2025) reporting to CEA
- **Europe**: Expected merger of existing groups into single *Group of Experts* on *Population and Migration Statistics* (including forced displacement)
- Africa: Regional Economic Commissions (ECCAS, AMU, COMESA, IGAD, ECOWAS, and EAC) all host Technical Working Groups on Migration Statistics that incorporate forced displacement





### Ideas to further enhance alignment

## Methodological alignment

Produce **concise & clear methodological note** on alignment and gaps between frameworks

Coherently **address remaining gaps** that are identified to advance operationalisation

# Build on existing regional & national cooperation

Migration & displacement working groups in several regions & countries

Create common spaces to exchange and document **lessons/experience** 

Pursue a joint and targeted capacity development programme

# Ensure appropriate linkages in existing/future resource

Cross-reference to new migration statistics recommendations in future IRRS & IROSS updates and other relevant resources

**Resources developed** on migration statistics should incorporate IRRS, IRIS and IROSS as appropriate

Joint efforts to enhance **SDG disaggregation and statistical inclusion** (e.g. ongoing DHS-9 review)
