Report of the Working Group on Exonyms

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1 Organizational aspects

The initial proposal for this Working Group (WG) was made at the 2nd GeoNames Meeting in October 2001 in Berchtesgaden (Germany). In 2002 the Eighth United Nations Conference on the Standardization of Geographical Names in Berlin established this WG by Resolution VIII/4 specifying its tasks with taking measures for "the categorization of exonym use, the publication of pronunciation guides for endonyms and the formulation of guidelines ensuring a politically sensitive use of exonyms".

WG meetings were held

- in Berlin, September 6, 2002, in the framework of the 8th UN Conference
- in **Prague** [Praha], September 24-26, 2003, hosted by the Czech Office for Surveying, Mapping and Cadastre
- in New York, 2004, in the framework of the 22nd UNGEGN Session
- in **Ljubljana**, May 19-20, 2005, hosted by the Anton Melik Geographical Institute of the Scientific Research Centre of the Slovenian Academy of Sciences and Arts
- in Vienna [Wien], 2006, in the framework of the 23nd UNGEGN Session
- in **Prague** [Praha], May 17-18, 2007, hosted by the Czech Office for Surveying, Mapping and Cadastre.

Currently the Working Group has 25 official members from 16 countries (see Appendix 2), but some meetings, especially these in Prague, Ljubljana and Vienna were attended by a much larger number of UNGEGN experts as well as of other interested persons. The elected convener is Milan Orožen Adamič (Slovenia, milan@zrc-sazu.si). At the 3rd WG Meeting in New York, Peter Jordan (Austria, peter.Jordan@univie.ac.at, peter.Jordan@oeaw.ac.at) was elected co-convener and since 2006 he substitutes the convener, after the latter had been appointed Slovenian ambassador in Croatia. 2 Achievements

Five items deserve to be highlighted among the activities conducted by the Working Group on Exonyms since its foundation by the 8th UN Conference in 2002:

• <u>New definitions</u> of endonym and exonym were after extensive discussion accepted by consensus and in accordance with the WG on Terminology proposed for inclusion into the UNGEGN Glossary on Toponymic Terminology:

Endonym Name of a geographical feature in an official or well-established language occurring in that area where the feature is located. *Examples:* Vārānasī (not Benares); Aachen (not Aix-la-Chapelle); Krung Thep (not Bangkok); al-Uqşur (not Luxor); Teverya (not Tiberias).

Exonym Name used in a specific language for a geographical feature situated outside the area where that language is spoken, and differing in its form from the name used in an official or well-established language of that area where the geographical feature is located. *Examples*: Warsaw is the English exonym for Warszawa; Londres is French for London; Mailand is German for Milano. The officially romanized endonym Moskva for Mockba is not an exonym, nor is the Pinyin form Beijing, while Peking is an exonym.

• Book on exonyms (see also individual WP): This book was published in 2007 within the series "Viennese East European Studies" [Wiener Osteuropastudien] and contains most of the papers presented at Working Group on Exonyms meetings, mainly at the meetings in Prague (2003) and Ljubljana (2005), plus some additional contributions. The discussion on definitions is an integral part of the book. But the book also highlights the exonym question in general from a multi- and interdisciplinary perspective. It examines the benefits of exonyms, the current trends of exonym use, and the standardization efforts related to exonyms on the national as well as on the international (UN) level. It is supplemented by a bibliography including further important reference works. The book may be considered as a first comprehensive reader on the topic of exonyms as well as the first tangible product of the Working Group on Exonyms.

- The <u>inclusion of exonyms in the UNGEGN database</u> was discussed and welcomed. The WG supported a reduction in the number of name category fields from three to two: endonym and variant.
- The <u>EuroGeoNames database project</u> was supported by the WG, and the questions
 of furnishing it with exonyms as well as of creating synergies with the UNGEGN
 database project was discussed.
- The questions of the <u>categorization of exonyms</u> as well as <u>criteria for exonym use</u> were intensively discussed especially at the Prague 2007 meeting (see also individual WP) and progress was made as regards the elaboration of guidelines for the use of exonyms.
