Valuing assets</b></p> <p><i>UNSD: discusses (a) the importance of valuing assets in assessing gender difference in asset ownership; (b) challenges in valuing assets; and (c) from whom the valuation data should be collected. The session also provides an opportunity for countries to share experience in obtaining or improving valuation data (also looking at external/independent data sources). Provide examples on indicators of gender wealth gap.</i></p> <p><i>Georgia: we would like to invite Georgia to reflect on the experiences related to collecting information on the value of assets in the EDGE pilot, including the sensitivity of collecting the data, the training required of enumerators to solicit sensitive information, the quality of data obtained, and whether external sources exist within the country to validate or supplement the data obtained.</i></p> <p><i>Kazakhstan, Indonesia, India</i>  Presentations on the collection of data on asset ownership and methods used to value of assets collected through household surveys including alternative methods to estimate asset prices or to supplement the information obtained in the household survey.
