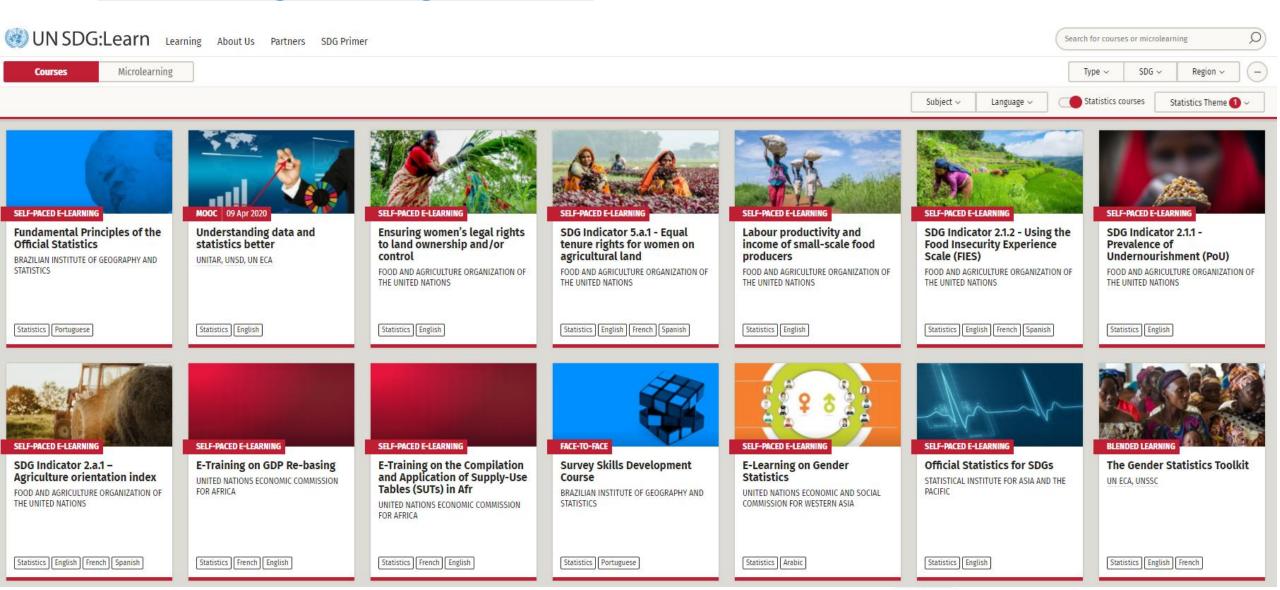

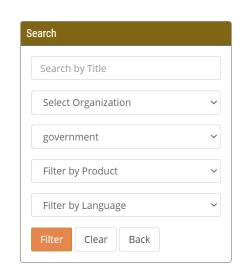

E-learning course "Understanding data and statistics better – for more effective SDG decision making" (Organized by: UNITAR)

Purpose of the initiative:

The e-course was developed by UNITAR, UNSD and UNECA with the aim to offer a double opportunity: i) to help improve the understanding of how better data can help design more effective public policies and ii) to brush up on your core data skills. The course covers aspects related to the interpretation, analysis, and presentation of data of direct relevance to the SDGs and more broadly national and sectoral policies aimed at ensuring sustainable and inclusive development. It introduces these topics using concrete examples of data use and public policy context from around the world. The course reviews both traditional and non-traditional data sources and discusses their uses, as well as the opportunities and challenges presented by the latter. The course contains 5 modules structured around key competences: awareness about data use and basic data skills, data assessment and interpretation, effective communication with data,

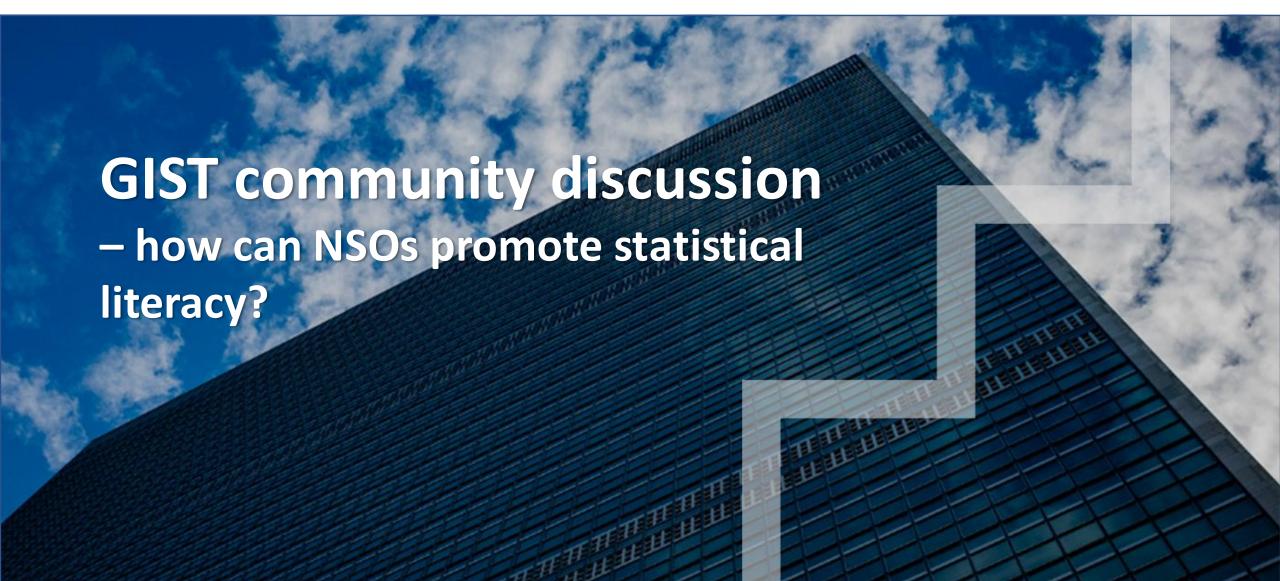

Does your institution have any Statistical Literacy program targeted at policy makers, media, data users, etc? Please describe. (Morocco)

- Program targeted at policy makers: Each year, we organize a meeting with the two chambers of the Moroccan parliament (deputies and councilors).
- Program targeted at media: We participated in the "Communication for Statistics" (C4S) project that was developed under the MEDSTAT IV program - Visibility and Relations with Statistics Users Sector. We launched a program in 2018-2019 to train and raise awareness among journalists and statistician
- Multiple platforms: Time use, gender and covid-19 impact on households, gender equality, labor market and me





Does your institution have any Statistical Literacy program targeted at policy makers, media, data users, etc? Please describe.

- Palestine: PCBS launched the Statistical School Competition since 2017 targeting pupils at schools (private, public and UNRWA).
- Japan: There have been several online statistical training courses offered by the government to a wide range of data users on a major MOOC platform which has more than a million users. https://gacco.org/stat-japan2/ (in Japanese language)
- Italy: In general Istat has developed a specific website session to become familiar with official statistics and Istat data and to "tell" statistical information in a simple way, using a friendly language. https://www.istat.it/en/data-at-hand

Does your institution have any Statistical Literacy program targeted at policy makers, media, data users, etc? Please describe.

- Mexico: Yes, INEGI is developing a statistical literacy program aimed at different users, with the target of build skills to analyze, understand and communicate statistical and geographic data for evidence-base decision making.
- Ghana: We are currently running a project called Data for Accountability Project which has presented a platform to engage Members of Parliamentary sub-committees. As of today, we have programmes with three parliamentary sub-committees.
- Ghana: Through a UNDP sponsored programme we have collaborated with an academic institution to develop a curriculum for training media persons. Related to that, we have institutionalised a pre-release training for all major and technical releases.





If not, is there interest in establishing such a program? Do you think it is the role of the NSO to have such a program?

- It is in the interest of NSOs to organize such programmes or at least events. This is a way to demonstrate transparency and to increase the use of statistics. It can also be part of the building the brand of official statistics.
- Yes, NSOs should constantly run statistical literacy programmes.
- Yes, it is the role of the NSO to have such a program. It will allow wide use of statistical data by the population and will contribute to improving the notoriety of the NSO.





How can GIST help in this area?

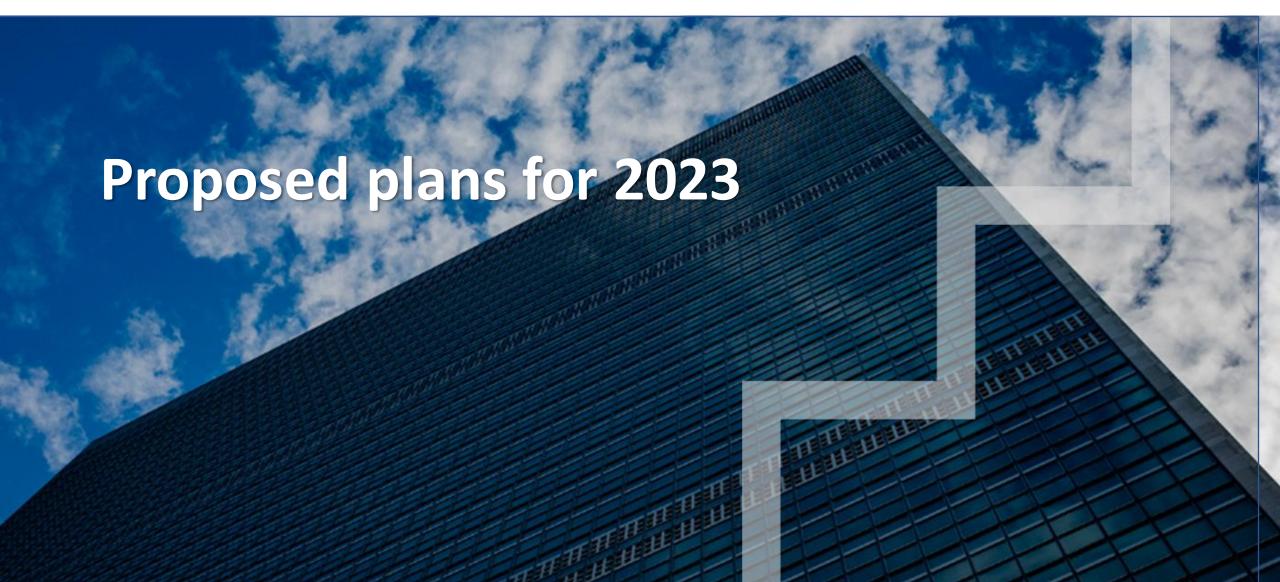
- Provide standard materials for designing such programs
- Provide expert assistance in the development of statistical literacy programs
- Share experiences and programs of different countries.
- We believe that it is helpful for members to exchange the best practices.
- GIST can support the development of training materials focused on statistical literacy, aimed to different profiles of user, like policy makers, media, students and data users.
- Rolling out the GIST training programme.
- GIST can help a lot by facilitating the exchange of experiences and good practices, and also by providing a platform where literacy tools and materials are made available.











Addressing specific NSO needs

- Continue the work on the gaps/needs assessment tool and related guidance
- Explore possibilities of piloting/testing the tool
- Discuss feasibility of other areas of work, taking into account guidance by the SAG





Online gateway and e-learning community of practice

- Outreach activities to increase awareness and facilitate sharing of experiences
 - Series of webinars to share good practices around certification and good practices for online courses.
 - Additional webinars to be organized based on needs and interest
- UN:SDG Learn Statistics hub
 - Add more courses to the platform
 - Collaboration with IAEG-SDG on a curated list of courses on SDG indicators





Statistical literacy

- Collect more practices from counties for statistical literacy inventory
- Continue work on the guidance note for NSOs either with joint forces or by hiring a consultant if funds became available, involve Academia
- Continue work on the evaluation approach for statistical literacy initiatives
- Organize webinars to showcase statistical literacy work of GIST and countries





From SAG: Any other areas that you would like GIST to focus on in 2023?

- Programs for trainers: It is important to have within each NSO qualified trainers in both the technical and pedagogical aspects. I believe that the GIST will be able to play a very important role in this field.
- Training engineering: I propose that the GIST continues to develop more activities to strengthen the skills of NSOs in training engineering from the analysis of training needs, design of training plans, follow-up, monitoring, and evaluation of training actions.
- 3- Specific training programs
 - Example training for the participants of the population census
 - Exchange and share specific training modules for the participants of the population census (Videos, MOOCS, ...etc)
 - Provide support for the design and creation of its training modules
- Yes, we would like to have such partnership with you in order to upload some training materials on the web such as: Data stewardship, data analysis, administrative records, and the use of data science tools in official statistics.
- GIST can contribute to the development of materials to define strategies to identify training needs in national statistical offices.





Areas where we need more input:

- Language/translation: How do we increase the number of languages for GIST products?
- Communications/fundraising: How do we do a better job of outreach?
- Sustainable training: Are we on the right path for sustainable training approaches?
