

Objectives

- Promote a coherent approach to legal identity across the UN system & with the World Bank Group
- Build on existing global, regional & country efforts
- One UN Voice for joint strategic advocacy & communications
- Enable joint UN support to countries for implementation

Benchmark Goal: *Close the global identity gap by 2030.*



UN Legal Identity Task Force

UN Legal Identity Task Force

- Oversees the implementation of the UN LIA at the regional and national level (engages with countries through Regional Commissions)
- Develops and maintains normative work related to UN LIA (with DESA leading as focal point).
- Engages in fund raising, advocacy and communication.
- Briefs DSG and other senior UN principals as required on latest developments on the implementation.
- Supports UNCTs to implement UNLIA

Defining legal identity



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Legal identity is the basic characteristics of an individual's identity

- Conferred through registration by an authorized civil registration authority
- In absence of birth registration:
 - May be conferred by a legally-recognized identification authority
 - Linked to the civil registration system for holistic approach from birth to death

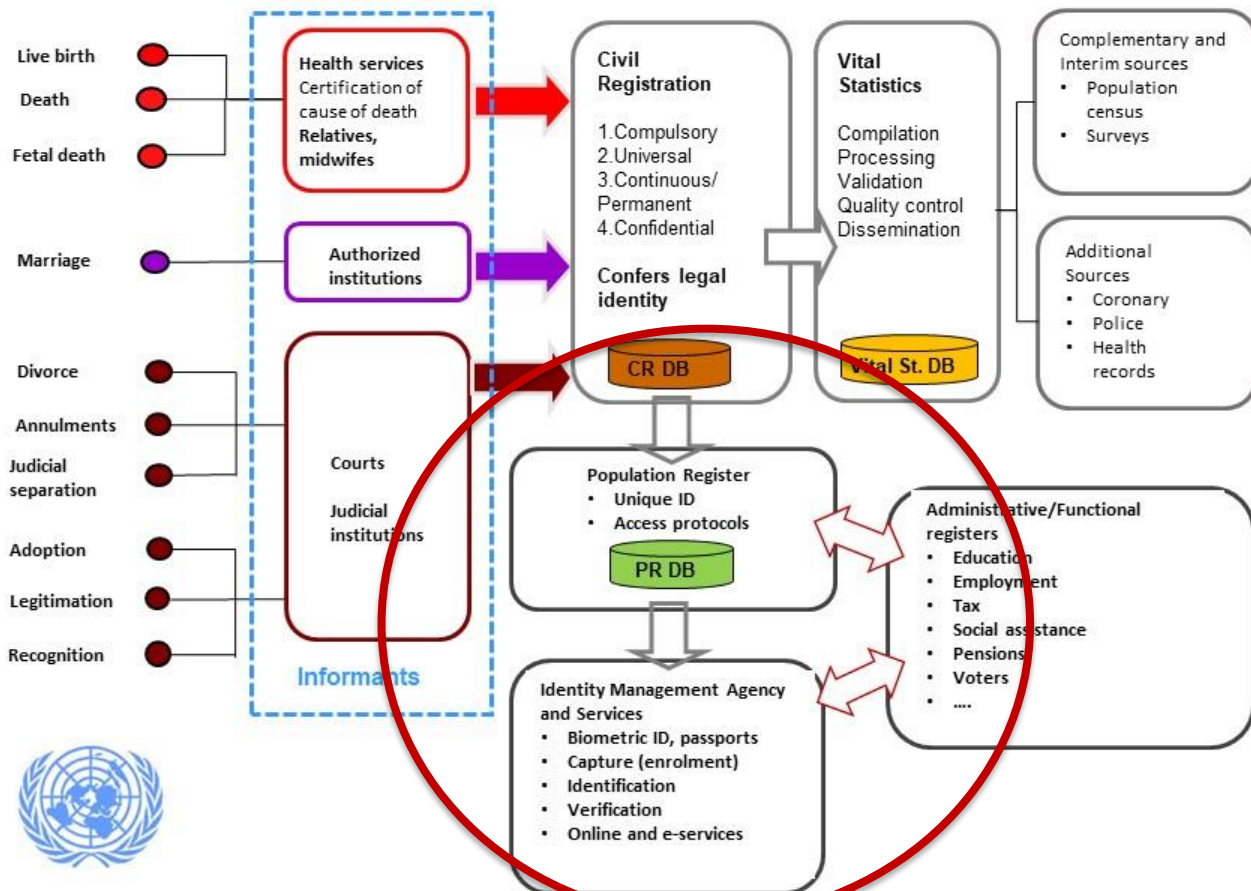
UN Legal Identity Agenda Approach



A holistic approach

- to civil registration of all vital events,
- production of vital statistics,
- population registers and identity management apparatus from birth to death
- **full interoperability** in a simultaneous manner
- in line with international standards and recommendations and in compliance with human rights of all people concerned, including the right to privacy

Civil Registration, Vital Statistics and Identity Management System



Simplified flow

This model represents a holistic approach to civil registration, vital statistics and identity management recommended by the United Nations, adapted from the United Nations *Principles and Recommendations for a Vital Statistics System, Revision 3*; it can be adjusted to national circumstances and governing structures as necessary.





Implementation of the UN LIA

- October 2019: Official launch of UN LIA at the Fifth Conference of African Ministers responsible for Civil Registration (COM5) in Lusaka, Zambia.
1. Country Work
 - ✓ Country rapid assessments conducted for 13 pilot countries in Africa – Cameroon, Cote d'Ivoire, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, Guinea, Kenya, Liberia, Mozambique, Niger, Nigeria, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Zambia
 2. International Normative Framework and Policy
 3. Communication/Advocacy and Partnership
 - Partnership with other initiatives in Africa and Asia and the Pacific
 - APAI-CRVS and Getting everyone in the picture
 - AU-UNICEF recently launched #NoName Campaign
 - ID4Africa



Progress so far

Country-level acceleration of UN LIA

- 13 pilot countries, with seed funding provided to 8 countries so far.
- Examples of multi-year funding for the above countries include:
 - UNICEF's multi-year, multi-country programme on “Strengthening Birth Registration Systems to Protect Every Child from Birth” (Norway)
 - UNDP's global programme on “Legal Identity for All” (Japan, Switzerland, Sweden)

Development of critical documents

- Key documents to guide Governments/UNCTs in the implementation.
- Knowledge-sharing through data and policy compilation, and other critical areas of research.
- Methodology development and studies on areas, e.g., innovation, data privacy, biometrics.

Exercise in continuation

- Costed strategic plan; CRVSIID case studies; CRVS and Social Protection; Cost of inaction



What we want to do

- Implementation and operationalization of the UN LIA at country level
 - Africa
 - Asia-Pacific
 - Latin America and the Caribbean
- Aligning systems in countries with well-functioning CRVS and ID systems, with UN LIA approach.
- **Ultimate goal:** To have universal registration of vital events, vital statistics, and legal identity from birth to death, in all countries.

Challenges

- Not able to operate to the full scale.
- Restrictions on ability to produce critical normative and implementation pieces.
- Limitations of funding, impacting engagement with other partners.



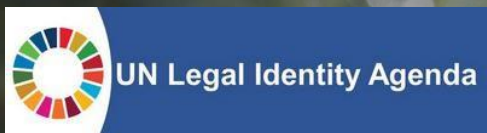
3 areas that merit more attention

- Humanitarian-development nexus (*inclusion*)
- More emphasis on Human-rights based Approach
 - ✓ Involvement of civil society (*inclusion*)
 - ✓ Reinforcing family relations in legal identity
- Digitalization of Legal Identity Eco-system
 - ✓ Principles on the responsible usage of biometrics
 - ✓ Data protection and privacy
 - ✓ Opportunities and Challenges of Open-Source Solution

Way Forward



- Accelerate the progress (still 850 million people, including 237 million children under 5 lack legal identity)
- Health - Civil Registration – National ID pathway is critical
- Improve inclusivity – leaving no one behind
- UNCT coordination is the key for ‘one UN’ approach

Overview of the situation/country context

Indicator	Current
Birth Registration Coverage under the age of 5 years old	49% (INE, Mozambique Population and Housing Census, 2017)
Birth Certification Coverage under the age of 1 year	33 per cent of boys and 32 per cent of girls aged below one have their births registered – (Census 2017)
Death Registration Coverage	12.1% (UN, 2020) that referenced a report DNRN, 2014
National ID Coverage	38% (NID, 2020)
Health Facility (Institutional) Delivery	70% (2015 DHS)
Interoperable Sites	143 Hospital based CRVS Postos were operational as of 1st Quarter of 2022 against a national total of 260 eligible health facilities (as at 16/04/2023)
Total number of birth registrations registered Jan 2018-Dec 2022	2,316,970 (1,160,825 male 1,156,145.00 female)
Total voter registered	13,162,321 (47% Male and 53% Female) for the previous electoral cycle

- One Concept, One UN Program for LIA in Mozambique;
- Positions the UN as a holistic, integrated solution for LIA that will address the resource and programmatic gaps;
- Build on the UN's competitive advantage, optimize the specialization of the relevant UN agencies;
- Assign each Result Area to a lead UN agency for the execution phase;
- Secure resources to enable the foundational and execution phases of the IP to be effective;
- Maintains a high-level UN profile in the LIA sub ecosystems;
- Development partners, particularly the bilateral agencies, will recognize the landscape analysis and its gaps, as well as the critical importance for the engagement of the UN, in realizing the President's Initiative for All and SDG 16.9;
- The UNCT Mozambique will set the tone for the UN engagement with the GoM, WB and bilateral agencies.

Way Forward for UN LIA in Mozambique

▶ Key issues for consideration:

- Mozambique made strides to ensure universal coverage of birth and death registration – however there is an urgent need to integrate civil registration, vital statistics and identity management system at national level considering the complex IDP crisis in the north.
- LIA is a priority at the highest level (ex. presidential initiative on ensuring identity for all)
- UNLIA is now a flagship in the UNSDCF SP-4 (strategic priority on Peace/Governance and Human Rights) – this will require robust coordination among all UN agencies to move the agenda forward and implement the plan.

▶ Next steps & opportunities:

- Operationalize the UNLIA IP under the leadership of the UNCT and SP4 leads, all agencies, including the WB.
- Chart out a road map for the integration between CRVS and ID management

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

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Country Case: Honduras

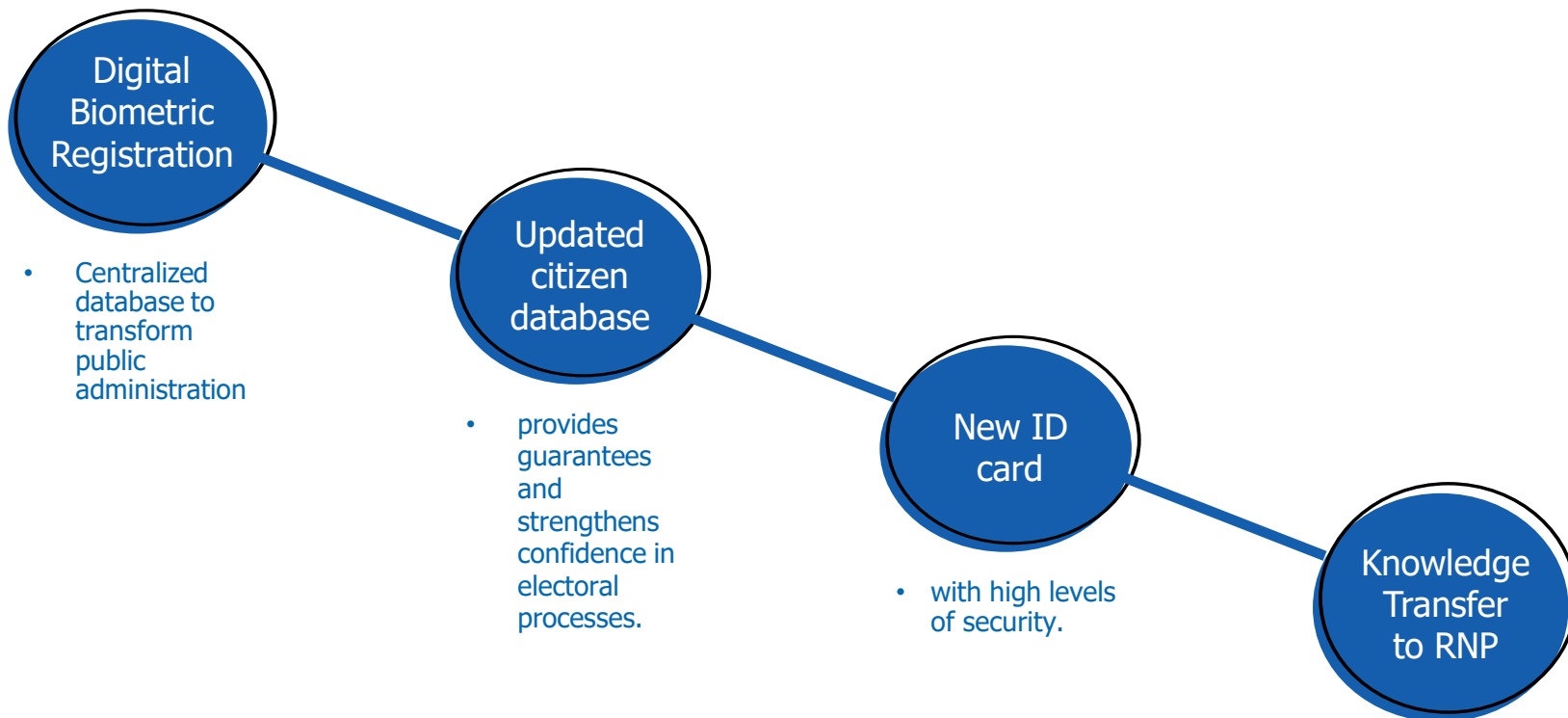

Support program for the
efficiency and transparency of the
process of **modernization of the national
identification document** in Honduras

- The 2017 national elections resulted in a **political crisis** never seen before in Honduras. One of the main issues highlighted was the **flawed electoral census**. This situation brought to light the **need to update the data of the civil registry**, which had not been done for more than 30 years.
- The **data of the civil registry is created by the National Registration Bureau** (RNP by its Spanish acronym). This government institution shares the data of the civil registry to the National Electoral Council (CNE by its Spanish acronym) which in turn, prepares the electoral census.

Goals



Implementation at the National Level

Field operation throughout the country



Achievements

The project successfully carried out the **mass enrollment** of more than **5.5 million citizens**: 2.6 million men and 2.9 million women.

The national data on the composition of **ethnic groups** has been generated for the first time in the country's history thanks to a massive logistical effort to reach each of the 18 departments of Honduras.
