33rd meeting of the High-level Group for Partnership, Coordination and Capacity-Building for the 2030 Agenda (HLG-PCCB)

UNHQ, New York 25 February 2024, Open meeting

Opening

1. Mr. Annim and Ms. Dhuli (co-chairs) welcomed members and issue partners to the meeting.

Workplan review (January – December 2024)

a. Preparations for the UN World Data Forum

- 2. Ms. Urdinola (Colombia) gave the group an update on the preparations for the UNWDF in Medellín, Colombia to take place between the 11 and 14 November 2024. The host country was confident in its plans to host up to 1,500 participants in-person at the Plaza Mayor Convention and Exhibitions Center for the main programme and the city's Botanical Gardens for the opening. The National Statistical Office together with its partners in the national, provincial and city Government were following a sustainable economic, social and environmental approach to organising the Forum.
- 3. Ms. Badiee (co-chair of the Programme Committee) introduced the work of the Programme Committee and the secretariat presented (see accompanying slides) on the proposed programme structure, status of the call for programme proposals and timeline for launching the programme. Members asked questions on criteria by which the proposals are chosen, limits on size of the panel and number of appearances on the programme, gender balance determination, and selection of short talks for the programme. More detailed information on these questions are available on the website. Members were also interested to support the representation of high-level political and other prominent speakers from the private sector, academia, and youth.
- 4. The secretariat also presented on the communications and sponsorship plans (see accompanying slides) for the Forum. Members welcomed more coordination with their own outreach events (i.e. StatsCafe in the Asia region and Stats Talks in Africa), the use of

the short video format to share key messages was also encouraged, especially to help those who will not be able to follow the programme online.

b. Selection of sixth host

5. The secretariat gave details on the timeline (see accompanying slides) for selecting the next host to hold the sixth Forum. A letter was sent out to the permanent missions of UN member states based in New York on the 13 December. Member States are requested to submit an expression of interest to host by 27 March 2024, whereupon the secretariat will ask them to prepare detailed bids by 27 August 2024. A special meeting of the group will be convened in September for short list purposes and the proposal with most votes will be announced at the closing ceremony of the fifth Forum on 14 November 2024.

c. Second phase realignment of the <u>Cape Town Global Action Plan</u> (CTGAP 2.0)

- 6. The secretariat and the host country of the Forum (Colombia) presented plans (see accompanying slides) on the realignment of the Cape Town Global Action Plan (working title: CTGAP 2.0). The secretariat explained the development since the last meeting of moving from a subgroup of HLG members to work on this to a joint working group of interested HLG members, issue partners and programme committee members. There were many advantages to a more enhanced joint working approach including adopting a wider data community perspective on the work and creating closer connections between the strategic nature of the CTGAP and the operational nature of the programme of the Forum.
- 7. The joint working group had split its work across the four Thematic Areas of the Forum/ Strategic Areas of the CTGAP. Colombia presented the collaboration platform and set of questions which will inform the realignment process and drive the fine tuning of new and existing priorities under the Strategic Areas. Programme Committee members (Paris21 and Open Data Watch) supported the CTGAP 2.0 work with a proposal to launch a Call for Commitments (see accompanying brochure shared during the meeting).
- 8. Members reflected on the development of the work under CTGAP 2.0 and asked this paid attention to any linkage to the new <u>Terms of Reference</u> of the Statistical Commission and wider issues faced by statistical and data systems like digitalisation, was founded on the <u>Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics</u> and aimed at the current 2030 Agenda/SDG timeline, tried to adopt a SMART (Specific, Measurable, Realistic and Timebound) approach as appropriate, recognised the different national and regional plans and international initiatives tied to the existing CTGAP and attempted to join up the narrative on where these had gone further. They further requested clearer instructions on the collaboration exercise and direction of work, including not to attempt to do too much at the same time and introduced a vocabulary and language which could be understood, related to, and supported by other parts of the data community.

Reporting from issue partners on work related to HLG-PCCB agenda

9. Issue partners from GPSDD, World Bank, PARIS21 and FCDO took the floor to update the group on the different initiatives under their responsibility related to partnership, coordination, and capacity-building for the 2030 Agenda. GPSDD gave an update on the recently held Festival de Datos and the High-Impact Initiative on the Power of Data initative, the World Bank on the Global Data Facility, PARIS21 on the National Strategy for the Development of Statistics programme and the Bern Network clearinghouse and FCDO on the UK government's strategy for international development.

Other areas of strategic importance tied to the Terms of Reference (ToR)

- 10. The secretariat drew members attention to the group's existing Terms of Reference (ToR) and made connections to four areas where the group may wish to review its role beyond its primary work on the global action plan and the organisation of UN World Data Forum: (1) the status of coordination in data and statistics, (2) continuing international dialogue with international data community, (3) engagement with new stakeholders and existing issue partners and (4) good practice in financing. Members shared a range of ideas to investigate such as the group's connection with its sibling group, IAEG-SDGs, each member's role as representative of their sub-region, the potential of the group to encourage peer learning, mapping between the ToR and important initiatives to understand gaps, the group as an enabler of implementation under the 2030 Agenda and its relationship with the political level and other parts of the international data community. The secretariat with the support of the co-chairs will bring these ideas back to the group at its next meeting.
- 11. Next meeting: **29-30 April** moved to a virtual setting.
