UN Women has identified 53 gender indicators among the SDGs



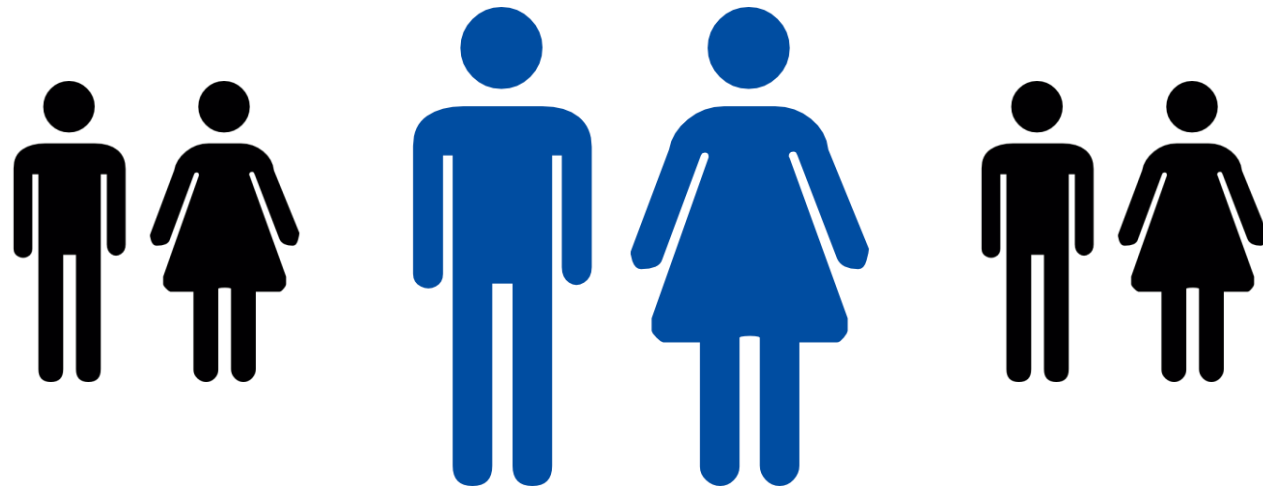

The SDGs also specify **11** disability indicators, all of which are included among the gender indicators

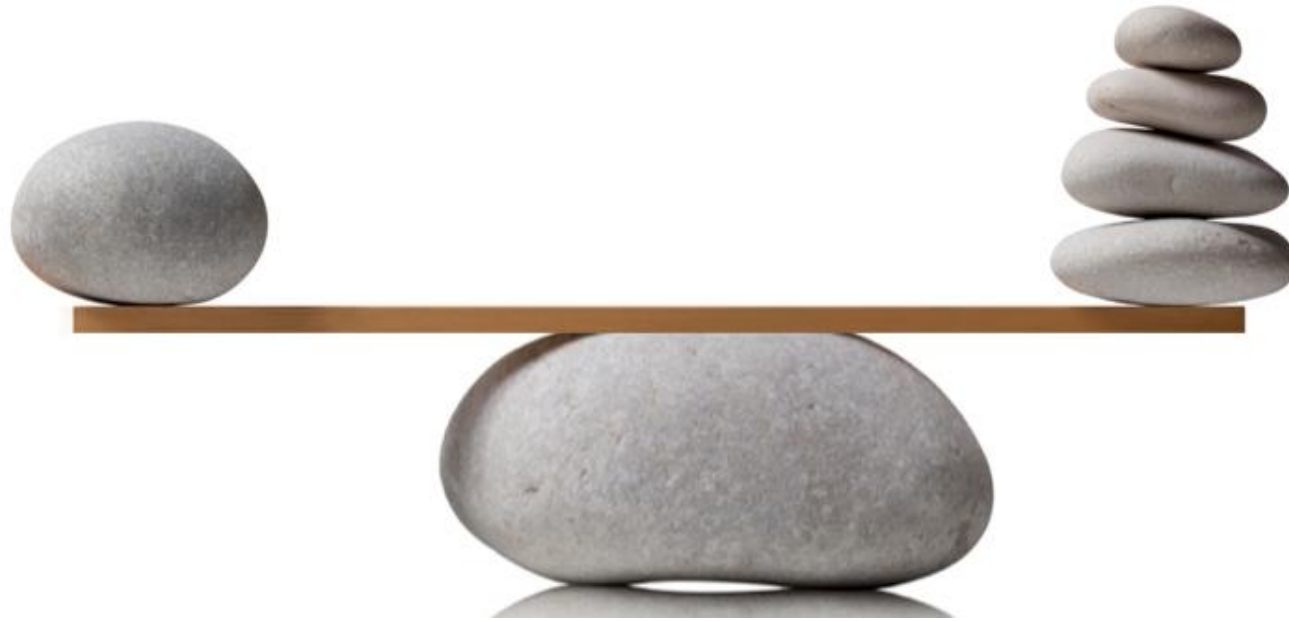

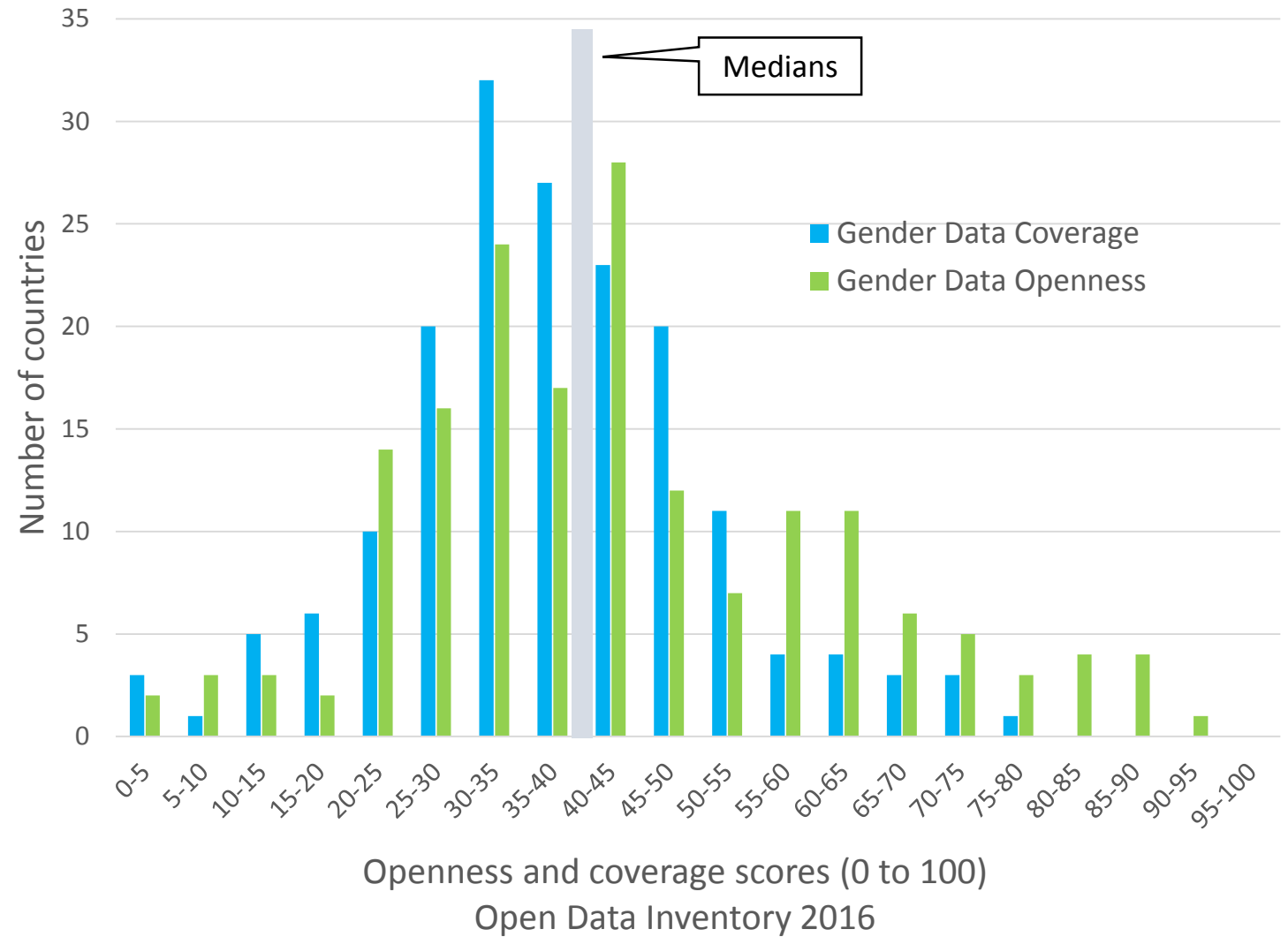


Openness and availability of gender data

The Open Data Inventory 2016 assessed the openness and coverage of 20 data categories in 173 countries

The ODIN gender index looks at 8 categories of importance for measuring the well being of women and children

- Demographic data
- Education outcomes
- Health outcomes
- Reproductive health
- Gender studies
- Poverty statistics
- Labor Statistics
- Built environment



Strengthening capacity for gender data



Champion data-informed policy and foster leadership and political will to link gender data with political change.



Build partnerships and alliances between government ministries and national statistics offices.



Make data open and engage with NGOs, academic institutions, and the private sector to drive the Data Revolution.



Create an organizational strategy to mainstream gender statistics in the national statistical system as a whole.



Achieve sustainable funding by prioritizing gender data and investing in national statistical systems and statisticians who collect and analyze gender data.



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
