Respond


to the UN Secretary General call to approach the crisis with authoritative facts against “fake news”








COVID-19 impact on drug trafficking: UNODC





Dramatic drop in foreign direct investment (FDI) in 2020 and 2021: UNCTAD


Many more children likely in monetary poor households: UNICEF

Figure 1. FDI inflows, 2015-2019 and 2020-2022 (Trillions of dollars)








Maintaining civil registration and vital statistics during the COVID-19 pandemic in Africa: ECA
