Intersecretariat Working Group on Household Surveys

- Improve **coordination**: surveys within the country and efforts at the global level
- Advance survey methodology
- Enhance communication and advocacy
- Established at 46th Session of UNSC in 2015
- Current (rotating) co-chairs: UN Women and WB
- Secretariat: UNSD
- Members: 10 international agencies and 8 countries



Developing thematic survey methodology

- Standards for education spending (UIS and WB)
- Measuring food consumption in household surveys (FAO and WB)
- A survey module on SDG 16 indicators (UNODC and UNDP)
- Consistent measurement of paid and unpaid work activities (ILO)



Developing cross-cutting survey methodologies

- Moving towards more **coordinated** national household survey programmes
 - Collecting and sharing survey information, a survey calendar? (various ISWGHS members)
 - Developing recommendations on a comprehensive national household survey programme (various ISWGHS members)
- Dissemination of household survey microdata
 - Household survey microdata dissemination (led by FAO, Open Data Watch and WB)
 - Spatial anonymization in public-use household survey datasets (DHS and WB)
 - Standards and best practices for survey data documentation (WB)
- COVID-19 and household surveys (UIS, UNSD, WB)



Task Force on COVID-19 and household surveys

The COVID-19 pandemic has presented itself as both a tremendous challenge and an opportunity to household surv programmes in countries.

The overall objectives of the Task Force are to (a) support the coordination of the COVID-19 impact surveys in countr provide guidance to countries both on maintaining the continuity of regular survey programmes and various methoaspects of COVID-19 related surveys; and (c) establish a collective vision on the implications of COVID-19 for reshapir national household survey programmes.

Solutional responses to COVID-19

Based on a survey carried out by UN Statistics Division and the World Bank, many national statistical offices have responded through innovative approaches.

COVID-19 impact surveys

Members of the Intersecretariat Working Group on Household Surveys are supporting countries to measure the impact of COVID-19 through sample surveys. As of 8 July 2020, we have supported about 180 countries through 480 surveys.



Annex 1. Checklist for planning and carrying out household surveys under COVID-19

COVID-19: Technical guidance note on planning and carrying out a household survey under COVID-19 The checklist is created to facilitate the planning and organization of household surveys. More detailed explanation of each item is available in the text in its corresponding section.

1. General principles

- Minimizing the risk of COVID-19 transmission among household survey field staff and survey respondents
- Limiting the field data collection activity to the minimum that is necessary
- Ensuring high quality and timely data are available for policymaking at the national and local level.

Systematic assessment of national data needs

• What should be collected through household surveys?

Strengthening survey infrastructure for CAWI and CATI surveys

• Sampling frame and accompanying mode-appropriate survey tools and protocols

Integrating survey data with other data sources

- Making survey data more interoperable
- Strengthening technical skills (e.g., record linkage, machine learning, multi-frame sampling)
- Data access and data privacy
- Building empirical evidence in developing countries
 - Validity and reliability of telephone and web interview compared to face-to-face
 - Data integration (multi-frame sampling, record-linkage, modelling)
- Strengthening capabilities for remote training and quality assurance
