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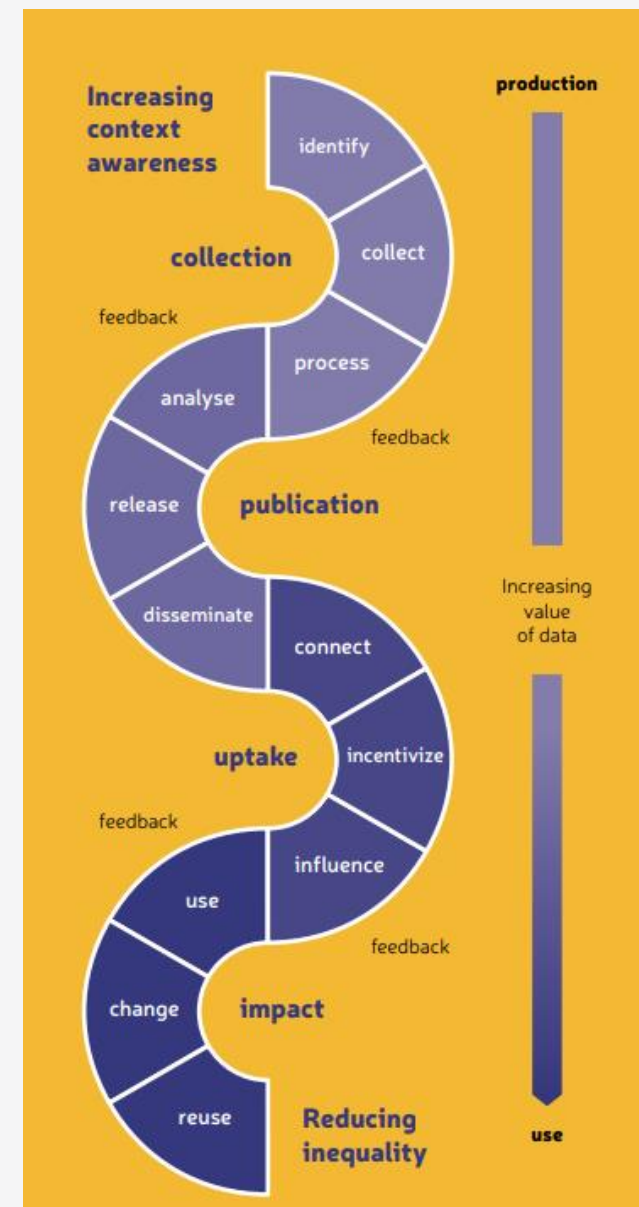
Why collaboration is key?

- Shift towards *intersectionality*

Five keys for taking an intersectional approach:

- Centre the voices of marginalised individuals in all aspects of data systems
- Promote equity across the data value chain
- Ensure data systems are safe and inclusive
- Engage data to increase awareness and reduce inequality
- Build inclusive institutions

- NSO *is not* and *can not* be truly inclusive in isolation
- Must engage with lots of actors throughout data value chain
