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Report of the United Kingdom Division

The official mapping organisations of most countries in the United Kingdom are all actively engaged in preparing their own versions of their national Geographical Information System (GIS). The scope of this will depend on the nature of the GIS itself. In the case of Great Britain, the GIS is really a Land Information System (LIS). This means that mapping becomes important.

The Ordnance Survey of Great Britain is producing digital versions of the topographic maps using the basic series, 1:50,000, 1:25,000 for urban areas, 1:2,500 for rural areas, and 1:10,000 for detailed urbanisation. The topographic content of this LIS will be at the service of all users of the digital form. The planned completion date for the basic LIS is 1995.

A revised edition of the OS-B 1:50,000 gazetteer is planned for publication in June 1990.

A new series of overseas tourist maps is in production. They are :

The Ordnance Survey of Northern Ireland has also started to construct a GIS by 1995. It will be based on 1:1,250, 1:25,000, 1:100,000, etc. maps of Great Britain. House numbers and post-codes, etc., will be included, as will names associated with the hydrology, the roads, railways, etc.

The Ordnance Survey of Northern Ireland is producing bilingual cultural maps of Northern Ireland in bilingual form. Since the map extends from coast to coast, the NISI is a instance of Ordnance Survey publications obtained for the names lying beyond the border. The legend is bilingual (English and Irish), and there is a bilingual gazetteer.

Research is now proceeding on the names contained in the new 1:50,000 map series. This research is intended to be conducted in Queen's University, Belfast.
