# **Kurna Place Names Web Site**

## **SUMMARY**

This report details the development of the Kurna Place Names web site.

The site has been developed as an initiative of the agreement between the Kurna people of the Adelaide region of South Australia and four local government authorities in the southern portion of metropolitan Adelaide and the adjacent rural areas.

The report outlines the reason and scope of the web site and explains the development process, the end result and the expectations of the web site.

# **Kurna Place Names Web Site**

## **INTRODUCTION**

The Kurna People are the Aboriginal language group who occupied the land in the vicinity of the City of Adelaide, the capital city of the South Australia prior to colonization.

As such, they were one of the first Aboriginal groups who interacted with the European settlers in 1836, and prior to that, with the sealers and whalers who had temporary occupation of various coastal sites.

In spite of the cultural erosion that took place in the subsequent years, the Kurna people still feel a very strong connection with the land and a desire to have their heritage recognized and protected.

## **BACKGROUND**

In 2005 four local government authorities in the southern portion of the Adelaide metropolitan area and adjacent rural area signed an agreement with the Kurna people, known as the Kurna Tappa Iri Regional Agreement.

The aim of this agreement is to increase the capacity and opportunity for Aboriginal people to influence and determine issues that are critical for their well-being. It has a strong emphasis on practical outcomes, such as the establishment of a business centre, protection of significant places, improving influence and holding of culturally important land and establishing guidelines for developers.

There are 7 objectives of the agreement. Objectives 3 and 4 of the agreement are as follows:

3. Promoting Kurna identity, culture and values.
4. Protecting significant places, sites and objects.

Flowing from these two objectives, a decision was made to develop a web site to show:

- Traditional Kurna place names for various topographical features and sites.
- The use of traditional Kurna place names for cultural features established after European settlement.
- The use of words taken from the Kurna vocabulary and used as place names.

## DEVELOPMENT

In order to develop this proposal, a partnership was established comprising the following bodies:

City of Onkaparinga	Representing the local government authorities and providing project oversight and financial management of the funds provided by the Kurna Tappa Iri Agreement.
Kurna Warra Pintyandi	A Kurna language program being run in conjunction with the Adelaide University, providing the contacts with the Kurna community, the source of the language and the means by which approval for the use of the place names is obtained.
Geographical Names Unit, Land Services Group, DTEI	Providing access to current gazetteer data, historical mapping and information, and technical assistance in the mapping of the place names. This unit will also provide an ongoing maintenance of the place names data used for the web site.

A private company, Beanstalk Creative Productions was contracted to develop the web site.

Given that this project was relating to the Kurna Tappa Iri Agreement, it was decided that the initial development would focus mainly on those names within the local government areas associated with the agreement. A certain number of key feature names outside of the agreement area would also be added for general reference.

Each name under consideration to be shown on the site is required to be assessed against a number of selection criteria, including the following:

- Is the name from the Kurna language, or was it imported from other languages into this area?
- Is it culturally appropriate to show this name on the web site?
- Is the spelling accurate and in harmony with the orthography being used in the Kurna language program?
- What else is known about the name? (e.g. meaning, location etymology etc)

The initial investigation revealed approximately 350 names relating to the types of places defined in Background Section above. As this was seen as being to long a task to verify all these names, a shorter list of 63 key place names was created for a first release of the web site, with other names being added latter as they are processed.

Google Maps was utilized as the background data for the web site. This proved to be a very low cost solution to a reasonable quality imagery and general mapping base.

## END RESULT

The end result has been a web site of Kaurna place names, showing the following information:

Field Name	Description
Kaurna Name	The name as represented by the Kaurna orthography.
Common Name	The common name in use today – this could be a name from another source or the currently used alternative spelling of the Kaurna name.
Refers To	A list of all the uses that a particular name is applied to – e.g. suburb, school, post office etc.
Alternative Spelling	Alternative spelling of the Kaurna name as recorded by various parties.
Other Kaurna Name	If any other name exists of the feature.
Voice	A sound file for the pronunciation.
Picture	A picture of the feature if appropriate.
Pronunciation Tips	Advice as to how best to pronounce the name correctly.
Pronunciation Analysis	Linguistic analysis of the pronunciation.
Etymology	An account of the meaning and history of the elements of the name.
Meaning	Meaning of the name.
Location Text	Description of the location of the feature if required.
Language Notes	Relevant information relating to language as applied to the particular name.
Cultural Notes	Notes relating the cultural relevance and importance of the place and or the name.
Source	Source documentation supporting the use of the name.
Status	Indicates if the name is of long standing use (either on maps or verbal tradition), is recently reinstated, a new name or a proposed name.
Feature Type	Indication of the type of feature.
Management Notes	Information relating to the management of a particular naming proposal.
Additional Notes	Any other relevant details.
Date Proposal Initiated	The date a naming proposal commenced.
Geographical Names Approval Date	Date the name was approved pursuant to the Geographical names Act if relevant.
Council approval date	Date the name was approved by the local government authority if relevant.
KWP Approval Date	Date the name was approved through the Kaurna Wirra Pintyandi processes.
Alternate GIS	Alternative location is seen as appropriate – this would then be used on the display instead of the latitude and longitude shown below.
Map Type	Indicates if the feature will use the point or area symbol.
Suburb	Name of the suburb or locality in which the feature is

Field Name	Description
	located.
Latitude	For location purposes
Longitude	For location purposes

Not all field of information are available to all users. Many of the field of information have the ability to be restricted to certain access levels only. There are three levels of access to the web site:

1. General access
2. Management access – for those who need to see all the data recorded.
3. Administration access – limited to select individuals who can then edit or add to the data.

Those who access data from the web site can select by either the Kaurna name or the common name, or can select a suburb or locality and obtain information on all the names within that geographic area.

Selecting one of the symbols with a mouse click will result in a 'balloon' appearing, showing of some of the available information, which can in turn, by selecting a 'Click here for more info' line, introduce a pop up window showing all allowable data based on the access rights of the user.

## **EXPECTATIONS**

The following outcomes are expected from this web site.

- It will be used as a resource for schools and community groups in relation to local Karna heritage.
- It will provide a recognition in relation to the importance of Karna heritage to the areas in which many South Australians live.
- The number of names shown on the web site will increase quickly over the coming months and then will slow down as only the new names will be added.
- The concept of this type of development will be used by other language groups in South Australia, and hopefully in other locations also.
