What is the American Time Use Survey (ATUS)?

- Continuous survey, 2003 to present
- Sample is drawn from households that completed U.S. labor force survey
- One person per selected household completes a one-time, one-day diary for an assigned day of week
- Collected via phone (CATI)



ATUS Lexicon

- Activity lexicon is designed to capture work activities, both paid and unpaid
- ATUS Activity lexicon has 17 major activity categories



17 major activity categories

- 01 Personal Care
- 02 Household Activities
- 03 Caring for and helping household members
- 04 Caring for and helping nonhousehold members
- 05 Work and Work-Related Activities
- 06 Education
- **07 Consumer Purchases**
- 08 Professional and Personal Care Services



17 major activity categories

- 09 Household Services
- 10 Government Services and Civic Obligations
- 11 Eating and Drinking
- 12 Socializing, Relaxing, and Leisure
- 13 Sports, Exercise, and Recreation

To collect codable activities, interviewers:

- Use conversational interviewing
- Use probing questions
- Ask summary questions about diary activities



Conversational interviewing

What did you do next?

- Read if necessary: An activity is anything you did during the day. Activities include both active
 tasks like socializing, preparing food, or eating; and more quiet tasks like thinking and relaxing.
 Right now, you are talking to me on the telephone. Talking on the telephone is one type of activity.
- 1. Sleeping
- 2. Grooming (self)
- 3. Watching TV
- 4. Working at main job
- 5. Working at other job
- 6. Preparing meals or snacks
- 7. Eating and drinking

- 8. Cleaning kitchen
- 9. Doing Laundry
- 10. Grocery shopping
- 11. Attending religious service
- 12. Paying household bills




Interviewers ask questions to collect codable activities

- To identify a purpose
- To clarify vague activities
- To collect more detail
- To identify work, income-generating, and volunteer activities



Probing questions





Use of probes

Respondent: "I was attending a meeting."

Interviewer: "Were you attending the meeting mainly for a class, for work, for personal interest, for volunteering or something else?"

Respondent: "It was a neighborhood association meeting—I attended it out of personal interest."

Interviewer records:

"Attending meeting (personal interest)"

Activity coded as:

Attending meetings for personal interest, 120202



Attending a meeting

Can be coded in many places:

- 05 Work and Work-related activity
- 06 Educational activity
- 08 Professional and Personal Care Services
- 09 Household Services
- 12 Leisure activity
- 15 Volunteer activity
- or other categories



Summary questions about diary activities

Ask questions to clearly identify:

- Work done for main job
- Work done for other job (if respondent has more than one job)
- Income-generating activities
- Volunteer activities




Summary question: Work done for main job

Interviewer:

"We are interested in measuring the amount of time people spend working both inside and outside their usual workplace. Were there any activities that were done as part of your main job? Please do not include getting ready for work or commuting."




"Were there any activities that were done as part of your main job?"



Summary question: Work done for *other job*

"Were there any activities that were done as part of your *other job*?"






Summary question: Income-generating activities

"You told me about the activities that were done as part of your job(s). Were there any other activities that you were paid for or will be paid for? Please do not include paid breaks at work or paid time off."



"Were there any activities you were paid for or will be paid for?"





Summary question: Volunteer activities

- "Now I'd like to ask you about volunteer activities, that is, activities for which people are not paid, except perhaps expenses. Yesterday, did you do any volunteer activities for or through an organization?"
- If yes: "Which of the activities that you told me about were volunteer activities?"

Information used to assign codes

- Activity recorded in diary
- Responses to summary questions
- Household composition
- Employment information about respondent
- Diary context, who was present, where the activity took place
- Interviewer notes



Mapping ATUS to ICATUS 2016

- ATUS lexicon seemed to map fairly well to ICATUS 2016
- Used class of worker variable to identify employment in corporations, government, and non-profit institutions

Used activity detail plus respondent's class of worker variable, TEI1COW:
