# Lessons learned

- The importance of time use survey data for various official bodies, local community institutions, researchers, and the private sector, to formulate various policies and programs. (such as transportation, education, health sector).
- Despite the importance of the survey data for calculating the SDG 5.4.1, the data of this survey are linked to many other development goals such as poverty eradication, health, etc.
- The importance of good communication with the respondent to know the details of the activity so that it can be coded correctly.
- Identify a list of minimum activities to facilitate the international comparison process.
- It is necessary to ask about secondary (simultaneous) activities in order not to ignore care activities, which often coincide with other activities

# The most important challenges

- Convince decision-makers of the importance of implementing this survey.
- Because this survey is very expensive if implemented independently, most statistical agencies work to include it with other surveys, which may reduce the quality of the data.
- There are no fixed criteria to determine each of:
  1. The target age group for the survey.
  2. Number of responding individuals within one family.
  3. If the journal is limited to time periods (a quarter of an hour), or is open.

# When we return

- Transferring knowledge from the time use workshop to colleagues in various national statistical offices.
- Striving to implement the survey within international standards and recommendations.
- For the statistical offices that implemented the survey, it is necessary to highlight the survey results in ways that highlight the importance of this data in policy-making.
- Search for advocacy bodies that adopt this survey because of its importance.
