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### WORLD MIGRATION REPORT KEY POINTS



- WMR series commenced in 2000 (biennial)
- Previously thematic, since 2018 it is a global reference report including Part I on data
- Aligned to IOM's Migration Data Strategy 2020 2025 and the UN SG's Data Strategy
- Highly collaborative with many IOM staff and external partners involved – contributors, peer reviewers, coauthors, co-editors, data scientists and co-creators
- Strong/deep knowledge of migration (data) is critical
- Report outputs in 10 languages (1 in 2005 and 5 in 2015)

# WMR: reach and usage

### A global reference report on migration and migrants

Used by Member States, academic and applied researchers, practitioners, students, teachers and the media

- Most successful IOM publication of all time with wide reach/access
- Referenced by over 60 media outlets worldwide in 25 languages in first 8 weeks
- More than 750 citations in research publications in over 20 languages
- Included in reading lists of migration courses in universities worldwide
- Used for fact-checking to counter "fake news" and "misinformation", including by officials
- Used by organizations such as World Economic Forum to explain migration

Readers ask themselves: Is this report reliable? Is this report credible? Can I trust that the contents are accurate?



# WMR: QA, QA & more QA

- <u>Starting point</u>: IOM's responsibility and obligation to serve Member States, migrants and the public
- Report readability and usability style, tables, graphs, etc
- Synthesis analysis with a focus on what has changed or is new/emerging
- Data verification processes
- Protocol referencing primary, every number sourced
- Clear expectations to thematic chapter authors
- Editorial review and expert peer review of final draft



  - Myth busting content, yet to transition to interactive






