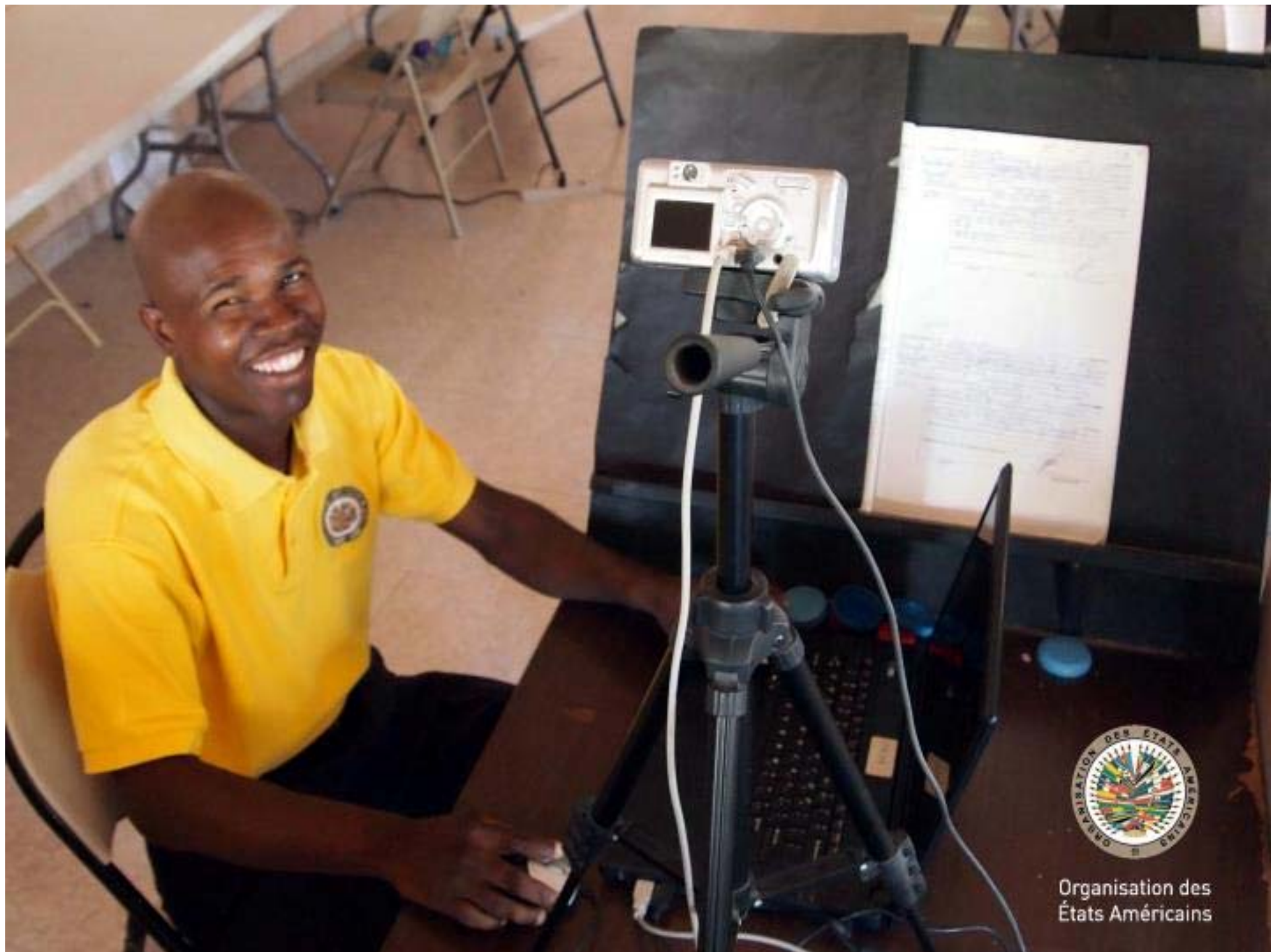

# Birth registration in the LATAM and The Caribbean

## Registered in 2005

According to UNICEF, 1 in 5 children under 5 years old did not receive a birth certificate

## Registered in 2015



● Registered ● Not Registered

In 2015, the number decreased to 8%

# The Caribbean

- ❖ No substantial under-registration index compared to South America
- ❖ Small amount of statistical data on the region; UNICEF provides information from 7 countries but leaves 7 countries out



# The Caribbean

## Civil Registry Modernization Project in the Eastern Caribbean

Between 2011 and 2013 the Universal Civil Identity Program in the Americas (PUICA) implemented the **Modernization of the Civil Registries of the Eastern Caribbean States and Belize Project** in Antigua and Barbuda, Belize, Grenada, Dominica, St. Lucia, St. Kitts and Nevis and St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

The overall objective of the project was to strengthen the capacity of beneficiary countries to implement a sustainable and integrated civil registry system, preserving the documentation in the Eastern Caribbean and Belize and storing vital statistic information in searchable databases.

# The Caribbean

## Civil Registry Modernization Project in the Eastern Caribbean

PUICA purchased equipment, developed software and trained data entry clerks to scan and input information from books containing birth, death, marriage, adoption and legitimization certificates.

PUICA completed its work in Antigua and Barbuda - **100% of the birth registries** and death registry books have been scanned, **87% of the data** entered and **78% verified** for accuracy. (2013)

Grenada - **92% of the birth, deaths, marriages and adoption registry books** scanned, 50% of all the images cropped (2013)

St Kitts and Nevis – **100% of the births registry books** scanned, 66% of the data entered and 61% verified for accuracy. (2013)

# The Caribbean

- Saint Lucia - **74% of the birth, 61% of death, 44% of baptism and 82% of marriage registry** books scanned and 30% of all images cropped (Sept 2013)
- St. Vincent and the Grenadines - **100% of the birth, death, marriage and adoption registry** books scanned and 96% of the birth images cropped (2012).
- Dominica - **77% of the birth, 84% of the death and 36% of marriage** registry books scanned. (Oct 2013)

# The Caribbean

## Achievements

1. The progress achieved through the digitalization of vital statistics records into searchable databases
2. The usefulness of these databases to modernize the operations of the civil registries
3. The possibility of interconnecting these databases with other government identities, such as passports offices, electoral institutes social security and vital statistics entities in order to maximize efficiency and assure transparency

# The Caribbean

## PUICA Initiatives

- ❖ 2.5 million registries of vital statistics were digitalized and catalogued
- ❖ PUICA is conducting a survey to improve the statistics in the region

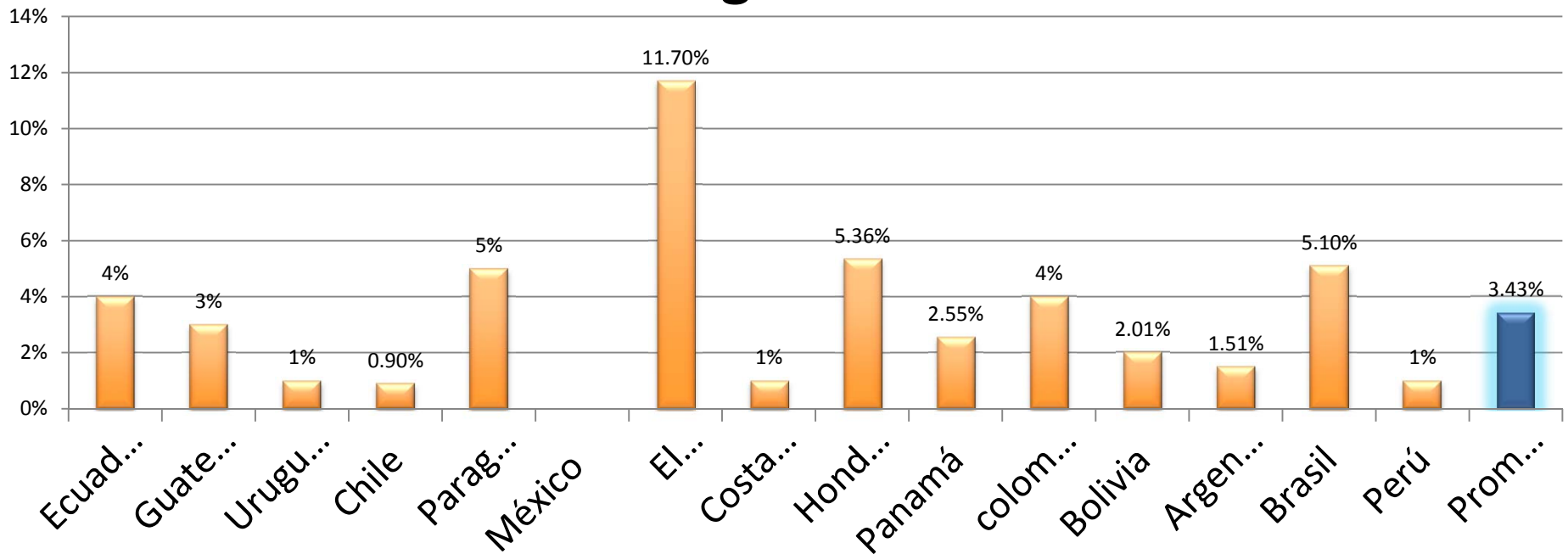

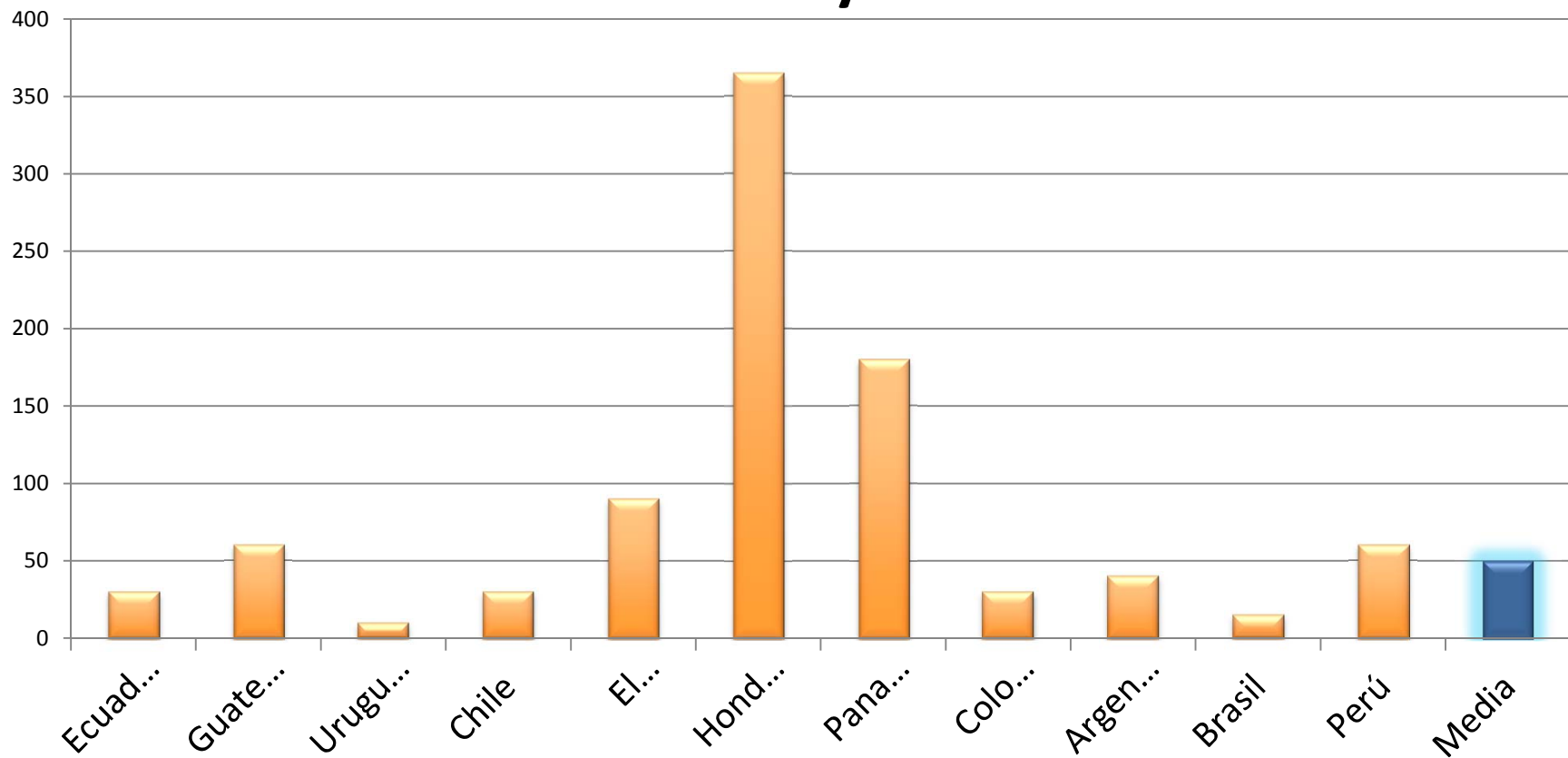
