Mapping Women's Participation in Local Governance

Abstract

Women's participation in local level governance structures is an important, but underresearched area. Despite the importance it holds, local government has proven challenging to
research in an internationally comparative perspective for two main reasons. First, there is
significant diversity in local governance structures. Each country has its own system of local
government, sometimes with internally disparate types and forms of local councils, bodies
and executive structures. Second, this wide range of governance structures has been difficult
to capture with comparable data. There is no repository of systematically-collected,
comparable information for each country on women's participation at the sub-national level.
UN Women has therefore been interested in the question, "is it possible to develop a
methodology which will enable a more comprehensive understanding of women's access to,
and participation in, local governance institutions, processes and leadership positions?" The
intention of the presentation is to seek feedback on a proposed methodology for future
development and refinement, and ultimately, data collection.
