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Updating of Toponymic Guidelines for map editors and other editors, Finland

The 4th, revised edition of *Toponymic Guidelines for map editors and other editors, Finland*, presented at the 22nd Session of UNGEGN, New York, 2004 (WP 49), has been updated (version 4.5, March 2011).

The updates concern, e.g., the distribution of population and languages in Finland (section 1 *Languages*), the list of publications (section 3 *Publications*), and changes in the administrative divisions (section 6 *Administrative divisions*).

Changes in administrative divisions and areas:

Second level: areas of operation of the regional state administrative agencies

The second level (country being the first level) division is called *the breakdown of areas of operation of the regional state administrative agencies* (*aluehallintovirastojen toimialuejako* fi, *indelningen i regionförvaltningsverkens verksamhetsområden* / *indelningen i verksamhetsområdena för regionförvaltningsverken* sv). The new second level division replaced the former one (6 *provinces* (fi *lääni*, sv *län*)) in the beginning of 2010.

Third level: regions

The *Itä-Uusimaa - Östra Nyland* region merged with *Uusimaa - Nyland* region, and the name *Itä-Uusimaa - Östra Nyland* disappeared as a region name.

Fourth level: municipalities

In 2010 - 2011 altogether 22 municipalities merged into 10 municipalities. In this process 13 names disappeared as municipality names but most of them remained as names of settlements.
