3. Systems. The following are commented upon below:

Iran = Transliteration of Farsi geographic names to Latin alphabet. [Tehran, 1966] (title-page in Persian and English)(a document presented to the United Nations Conference on Geographical Names, Geneva, 1967; its adoption was recommended by the Conference in its Resolution 12).

JK/US = U.S. Department of State. Romanization Guide, 1967. Shows the jointly agreed --in 1958-- system used by the [U.S.] Board on Geographic Names and the [U.K.] Permanent Committee on Geographical Names for British Official

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ROMANIZATION OF PERSIAN

- 1. Persian, the modern language of Iran and vestern Afghanistan (also used in Pakistan, and by Indian Muslims as a literary language) is written in an alphabet based on the Arabic script. This alphabet's relationship to the pronunciation of modern Persian is slight: The letters are --as in Arabic and Hebrew-- principly consonants; a few are also used secondarily to represent certain vowels, but full indication of vowels, when provided at all, is by means of a system of done or strokes adjacent to the consonantal characters.
- 2. Problems. Because Persian orthography is based on tradition, it often shows differences which do not exist in pronunciation. The systems given below are mainly based on spelling.
