## Background

In 1982, the Conference recommended that countries should be encouraged to publish and keep up-to-date Toponymic Guidelines for Map and Other Editors. The aim was to enable cartographers of other countries to correctly treat all problems of cartographic toponymy of the countries that produced such guidelines [4th UN Conference on the Standardization of Geographical Names, Resolution IV/4: https://unstats.un.org/unsd/geoinfo/UNGEGN/ungegnConf4.html]. A sample prepared by former UNGEGN chair Josef Breu and submitted by Austria to the Eighth Session of UNGEGN in 1979 [W.P. 5: https://unstats.un.org/unsd/geoinfo/UNGEGN/docs/8th-gegn\_docs/8th\_gegn\_WP5.pdf] served as basis for the guidelines. This format has been updated and enriched over the years. TG include information about official, national and minority languages, names authorities, source material for toponyms, glossaries, abbreviations used on official maps and administrative division.

# **Updated and new Toponymic Guidelines**

At the 29<sup>th</sup> Session on the Standardization of Geographical Names three countries presented updated versions of TG:
