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

- Gender-based impact of crisis
 - Zika, Ebola
- Need of Time Use data
 - Assessment of time spent on unpaid activities, especially child care
 - Teleworking / homeschooling
 - System of National Accounts

Instrument development



- Based on countries information need
 - Matrix completed by members according to their countries needs
- Review of countries instruments during COVID-19
 - Italy – United Kingdom – Un Women – ILO – Australia – LAC
- Virtual meeting held monthly or bi-monthly to develop and agree on stylised questions format for yesterday in addition to a background questionnaire to get socio demographic characteristics, employment and activity status and literacy
 - Keep it short (15') – min burden on respondents and min processing time (for timely data during crises);
 - No verbatim – re-coding of activities would be too long to process;



Proposed draft of the instrument

Required content

- Sleeping
- Eating
- Own final use (e.g. construction, collecting water)
- Unpaid house work and care work
- Volunteering
- Background questionnaire: household composition, demographic information, ILO questionnaire questions

Optional content

- Travel
- Items in the background questionnaire:
 - Food production for own use
 - Job searching
 - Changes in work situation
 - Type and location of work
 - Work situation of the spouse

Limitations / next steps

- Limitations:
 - This is solely to provide an assessment of the impact a crisis has on the daily life and routine habits
 - It is not comparable to Time Use data collected using a diary and is only a snapshot for a specific moment
- Next steps:
 - Provide methodological guidance around collection and data dissemination
 - Test the questionnaire in different collection mode and countries
