## **Terminology workstream: Objective**

**Objective:** conduct a review of the current macroeconomic accounting terminology and branding across countries and seek to foster comparability, consistency, and understanding of macroeconomic by users.

- the goal does not include changing the concepts currently used.
- the goal is to identify complementary alternative terms for more consistent and accurate use in the communication with non-experts, to better convey the meaning and interpretation of the definition, concept, and data to users.
- the goal is also to review the branding of the macroeconomic accounting manuals.

#### The Task Team is expected to:

- > evaluate the terminology and labelling used by the macroeconomic accounting manuals and assess if it is still relevant and consistent with the macroeconomic domain.
- take into account the different audiences and users of macroeconomic statistics.

## **Terminology workstream: Objective**

#### Weighing the costs and benefits of a change in terminology and presentation

- The cost of any change in terminology and presentation is significant and most likely outweighs the benefits.
- As an alternative, a complementary set of stylized tables/accounts, indicators, terms with a more modern appeal can be considered but the underlying concepts remain unchanged.

#### Costs

- Retraining of compilers
- Updating of standards, manuals, guides, training materials
- Update of titles, tables, sources and methods

#### **Benefits**

- Increase Interpretability
- Potential increased use
- Potential reduction in misreporting



# **Terminology workstream: Activities**



#### **Terminology**

The work will include a review of all terms used by the macroeconomic accounting manuals.



#### **Branding**

The work will include a review of the overall branding, including the way the versions of the manuals are labelled and the way the system as a whole is referenced.



#### Labelling

The work will include a review of the labelling of accounts and tables.



#### Survey

The review could include a survey to compilers and users to know the terminology they are using and how it is understood by users.

# Terminology workstream: Possible developments



#### **Terminology**

- Primary, Secondary, Disposable Income are these terms well understood?
  - would *Earned Income* be a more appropriate term for primary income?
- The use of disposable income account
  - would an appropriate alias be Saving and Investment Account?
- Do users understand the technical concepts generally used in national accounts?
  - could user-friendly alternatives be suggested?



- How do users interpret the 2008 SNA brand?
  - 1953, 1968, 1993, and 2008 SNA?
- Should the new next version of the SNA include reference to a year?
  - 2025 SNA versus SNA?
- Do users understand what is national accounts compilation and relate to GDP and other key aggregates?
- Do users understand the coverage and scope and the links with other statistical domains?



# **Terminology Workstream: Feedback from UNECE webinar**


How to reach out to users to avoid misunderstandings?

How to enhance the appropriate use and exploitation of all the enormous wealth of information in the SNA (beyond headline GDP)?

- Different layers of complexity in terminology for different typologies of user.
- Important to distinguish between:
  - communication aimed at users (focused on appropriate interpretation and use)
  - **communication aimed at compilers** (focused on specific parameters and technical details required for appropriate measurement).
- Need of specific terms, but the challenge is to communicate in the "real world".
- Importance of finding user friendly terms in English, but also to find good equivalents in other languages.


#### **Terminology Workstream: Feedback from UNECE webinar**

- Effective visualization tools (infographics, illustrations, graphic schemes) have great potential to make statistics more accessible to a broader audience.
- Analyse **current best practices** as input to developing complementary terminology.
- Strengthening the partnership and coordination with the dissemination department of the NSOs.
