Comment:

This chapter provides a very comprehensive overview of price and volume measurement in national accounts. Our comments refer to parts A and B of this chapter. One specific issue that appears not to have been included so-far, is the treatment of price changes from zero to a price above zero (or vice versa), i.e. products that were initially offered for free, but for which buyers have to start paying (e.g. from initial free use of motorways to a toll charging system).

Index number theory

Section B presents an overview of index number theory as applied in the System. It has been updated to reflect work during the last decade embodied in the new manuals on consumer price indices, producer price indices, and export and import price indices (available in draft).

1. Paragraphs 16.10 - 16.88 present this overview. Are these paragraphs clear and appropriate to the SNA?

General	As regards chain indices, it would be appropriate to insert a statement that chaining
comment	only makes sense when it is implemented at a sufficiently detailed product level.
16.14	"Unit value indices measure the change in the average value of units that are not homogeneous" could be replaced by "Unit value indices measure the change in the average value of units that are not necessarily homogeneous"
16.50	Contrary to what is stated, there are established standards as regards the chaining technique for the annual chaining of quarterly data. The IMF and Eurostat, for instance, recommend the use of the one-quarter overlap technique and consider the annual overlap technique as a good alternative, which has the advantage that no additional benchmarking is necessary for non-adjusted data. Most EU countries also use the annual overlap technique.
16.57	While chaining helps ameliorate problems of constant quality comparisons, it is not sufficient; The application of explicit quality adjustment techniques (e.g. hedonics and option pricing) is – as also acknowledged in 16.85 - still needed.
16.58	We question somewhat the wording that additivity is a very restrictive property, particular since accounting identities are at the core of national accounts. We suggest highlighting that Laspeyres volume indices have the positive feature of additivity and that Laspeyres volume indices in constant (previous) year's prices preserve this feature. This is also one practical advantage over Fisher indices which seem to be favoured in this draft.
16.63	Given that – within the EU – almost all countries have adopted the annual overlap method, we suggest adding an appropriate formula for contributions to growth also for this method (e.g. the formula used by Eurostat).
16.70	This paragraph is not completely clear; we do not understand what the reason is for treating changes in the customer-composition as a volume change.

Derivation of volume measures in the national accounts

Section C is considerably expanded from its counterparts in the *SNA 1993*. The ISWGNA agreed that this expansion was needed and that the new price manuals provided useful input for the expansion.

2. Paragraphs 16.89 - 16.183 cover price deflation vs. quantity revaluation, volume measures of the output estimate of GDP, volume measures of the expenditure estimate of GDP, volumes and prices for stocks of non-financial assets and consumption of fixed capital, components of value added, measures of real income for the total economy, and other aspects of price and volume measurement. Are these paragraphs clear and appropriate to the SNA?
