General comments:

General	While the chapter includes much of the relevant material on the household
comment	sector, it understates the focus of much analysis of the household sector
	which requires household income and expenditure survey data to
	disaggregate households into various characteristics. While this is more
	within the realm of satellite accounting, the standard household sector
	accounts have an important role to play in defining the concepts and
	coverage.
	Some specific comments are provided below.

Part II: Comments on specific draft paragraphs and sections

All comments on specific draft paragraphs are welcome. They can be about e.g. scope, content and clarity. Proposing a concrete alternative text or table is also possible. For the paragraphs in separate sections, separate forms are used for providing and collecting comments (see below).

General comment	
24.1	The word 'final' needs to be inserted before 'consumption' as corporations also consume goods and services (intermediate consumption) in the process of production.
24.2	A more generalised lead in should be provided as to why there is an interest in studying the household sector. The current paragraph is quite restrictive in that it refers to modelling of impacts of government policy.
	It is suggested that something along the lines of the following be included as an introductory paragraph-
	'Ultimately, it is households that benefit from economic activity through their direct engagement in the production process, the receipt of property income such as dividends from corporations, transfers such as social security payments or use of goods and services provided free by government. While the standard accounts for the household sector provide this type of information for households as an aggregate, there is also a great deal of interest in dissecting this further by types of households for studies of income and wealth distribution or extending the production boundary to include the value of unpaid services provided within the household or volunteering.'
24.3	Sub headings 1 and 2 look out of place preceding 3. The structure of the chapter. Suggest retain the paragraphs as introductory material, but delete the sub headings.

24.9	First sentence suggest delete all words after the word 'sub-sector'.
	Also suggest that an introduction to the 'production perspective' is
	incomplete without a brief mention of unpaid services consumed within the household. It is a typical subject for household analysis.
24.10	The second sentence should read ' The proportion of expenditure"
24.11	This would seem to overstate the analytical shortcoming. Suggest this paragraph and paragraph 24.12 could be deleted.

24.21	Suggest delete the last two sentences. As it stands it could be seen as downplaying the importance of the further sub-sectoring of households and particularly micro data analysis of household income, expenditure and wealth undertaken in a number of countries. This type of work should be encouraged.

24.33	Suggest delete the words 'in principle' in the first sentence and the whole of the final two sentences of the paragraph. FISIM on housing mortgages is likely to be a significant component of the intermediate consumption in providing housing services. The existing paragraph implies that no harm might be done in leaving it out.

The national accounts can provide the concepts and benchmarks (micro-macro linkages) for such work. Suggest an additional paragraph referring to household income and expenditure surveys providing a rich source of information that can be linked back into the SNA household accounts.
24.41	Suggest insert the words 'many times' before the word 'larger' in the last sentence.
