Most households under declare their incomes while others genuinely forget such sources as the occasional remittance or property income such as interest or dividends. We feel therefore that the level of consumption is a much better sectoring device than income. Also the use of the production perspective (24.6)should give a good indication of the type of incomes earned by households.
