Developments Towards the Measurement of Sustainable Tourism in Fiji

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Tourism in Fiji

- Tourism is a significant activity in Fiji largest foreign exchange earner
- It contributes over 10% to total GDP and has a significant indirect contribution, with estimates of the total direct and indirect effect of tourism activity of over 30%
- Given this large contribution, it is critical that the tourism industry be sustainable
- Measuring Sustainable Tourism can contribute towards good management

Sustainable tourism in the Fiji context

- Protection of natural environment to continue being an attraction to visitors, thus ensuring the sustainability of destinations as tourism products;
- Sustainable practices that would ensure that key players such as hoteliers are at the forefront of protecting assets as islands are prone to natural disasters and hazards;

Sustainable tourism in the Fiji context

3. Protection and conservation of Fijian culture and heritage as a niche tourism product that contributes to its preservation;

4. Maintaining and sustaining both land and marine assets; and

5. Benefits to local communities through economic development, employment creation, infrastructure development etc.

MST Development in Fiji

- UNWTO Mission in 2016
- There is a starting foundation in developing a statistical framework for measuring sustainable tourism in Fiji
- MST works to bridge two UN standards: the Tourism Satellite Account (TSA) with the System of Environmental Economic Accounting (SEEA)
- Supply Use Tables (48X114) and TSA are compiled regularly and work is progressing on three SEEA Accounts (Water, Waste and Energy)

- MST framework will have, as a central feature, the articulation of links between the SEEA framework and TSA
- An Alternative Indicator of Well-being Survey in 2016 captured a great deal of information on Culture
- Culture Related Occupation and Industry details is captured in Population Census and Labour Force Surveys

Useful Information We Hope to Produce

Information such as:

- a) Environmental impacts of tourism: emissions, solid waste, wastewater, disruption of ecosystems and biodiversity
- b) Dependency of tourism on the environment: water and energy requirements, healthy and good quality ecosystems (beaches, reefs, forests)
- c) Environmental protection expenditure and environmental taxes
- d) Some socio-economic impacts and dependencies of tourism such as employment
