		Related to that matter, as information BPS-Statistics Indonesia currently conduct 2 surveys, there are: 1. Indonesia Democracy Index (IDI), 2009-Now The Indonesian Democracy Index (IDI) is a tool to measure the development of democracy in Indonesia.				
		There are three main aspects: civil liberties, political rights, and institutions of democracy. IDI not only sees a picture of democracy from the performance of government/ bureaucracy alone. But also see the development of democracy from aspects the role of society, legislative institutions (DPRD), political parties, and judiciary & law enforcement agencies.				
		IDI data collection combines quantitative and qualitative approaches as complementary process. In the first phase, data is collected from newspaper coding and written documents such as local regulations. The result then verified and elaborated through Focus Group Discussion (FGD) as the second stage of data collection, as well as exploring cases that are not yet captured in previous stage. In the third stage the collected data is verified through in-depth interviews with competent resource persons.				
		2. Anti-Corruption Behavior Survey (ACBS), 2012-Now				
		ACBS conducted to get an overview of the respondents' attitudes toward the practice of everyday corruption (petty corruption) that exist in society. ACBS measure respondents' assessment (opinion) of certain habits in society and personal experiences related to the public service. The total number of samples was 10,000 households and produced data merely on national level.				
	The concept and definition, frame work, methodology, and field experience from both surveys could be used as an input for the development of a Handbook on Governance Statistics for national statistical offices if needed.
