



#### **OVERVIEW**



The United Nations Statistical Commission, established in 1947, is the highest body of the global statistical system. It brings the chief statisticians of Member States together from around the world. It is the highest decision-making body for international statistical activities, especially the setting of statistical standards, the development of concepts and methods and their implementation at the national and international levels.

The Commission oversees the work of the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD), and is a functional commission of the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC or the Council).

During the session, delegates are encouraged to:

- Actively contribute.
- Be brief and concise in oral interventions.
- Share national practices, report routine activities or detailed expositions of methodology in written form rather than orally. Such country notes will be presented on the Commission website.

Delegates also have a chance to meet statisticians from:

- National Statistical Offices
- International Organizations
- Secretariat (UNSD)
- Other delegations at the reception on Tuesday evening

#### **MANDATES**

The terms of reference of the **Commission** state that it shall assist the **Council** (ECOSOC resolutions 8 (I) of 16 February 1946, 8 (II) of 21 June 1946 and 1566 (L) of 3 May 1971):

- a) In promoting the development of national statistics and the improvement of their comparability;
- b) In the coordination of the statistical work of specialized agencies;
- In the development of the central statistical services of the Secretariat;
- d) In advising the organs of the United Nations on general questions relating to the collection, analysis and dissemination of statistical information;
- e) In promoting the improvement of statistics and statistical methods generally.



On 6 July 2017, the General Assembly (resolution 71/313) adopted the global indicator framework for the Sustainable Development Goals and targets of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development developed by the Inter-Agency and Expert Group on Sustainable Development Goal

Indicators, as agreed upon by the Statistical Commission at its 48<sup>th</sup> session, as a voluntary and country led instrument that includes the initial set of indicators to be refined annually and reviewed comprehensively by the Commission at its 51<sup>st</sup> and 56<sup>th</sup> sessions.


It also requested the Commission to coordinate the substantive and technical work to develop international statistical standards, methods and guidelines, where necessary, to fully implement the global indicator framework to follow up and review the Sustainable Development Goals and targets; and to further refine and improve the global indicator framework.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

The Commission consists of 24 Member States of the UN elected by the ECOSOC to serve a term of four years based on an equitable geographical distribution as follows:

All other States are considered **Observers**, but the Commission traditionally treats Observer and Member States equally during its discussions. The **Chair**, **3 Vice-chairs** and the **Rapporteur** are the 5 officers of the Commission, known as the **Bureau**. They are elected for a one-year term with the expectation that they will serve for a further year if available. Nominations of these officers are made by the Commission with elections held at the beginning of the session. In practice elections are by acclamation.



#### **AGENDA**

The agenda is organised in the following sections:

- Opening
- Election of officers for the year
- Adoption of the agenda and timetable
- Items for discussion and decision (Tuesday Thursday morning)
- Items for information (Thursday afternoon)
- UNSD programme questions (Friday morning)
- Provisional agenda and dates for next year's session
- · Report of the Commission on its fiftieth session

The adoption of the agenda is normally a routine matter; last minute changes are unusual.



Items for discussion and decision are for the Commission to discuss and make decisions or take actions. The chair will mention the relevant document related to the item, an oral introduction will be given by the author, the chair will open the floor for discussion, and a summary will be made by the Secretariat (UNSD staff) after the discussion of each item.

Items for information refer to progress reports, which the Commission takes note of usually without further debate.

Information items are handled as a block. However, the Chair will offer the Commission the opportunity to identify information items for which clarifications or updates are needed.

#### **DOCUMENTS**

There are two types of documents related to the Commission:

- Official documents: Formally edited and available in the 6 official languages of the UN. They are subject to a strict word limit and submitted to the Secretariat in November. They carry a formal document reference. For example: E/CN.3/2019/1 where E is for ECOSOC, CN.3 is for Statistical Commission, 2019 is the year and 1 is the document number.
- Background documents: Accompanying a specific agenda item. Not formally edited and therefore do not have a word limit. They are typically available in English only and become available at different times over the days before the Commission session starts.

All **official documents** will be available electronically both on the Commission website and on the PaperSmart portal. They can be printed on demand (POD) in the "print shop", located on floor 1B (by the escalator).print shop.

A few copies of **background documents** may be available on side tables in the conference room.

Only the **draft report of the session** and any **draft resolutions** (if applicable) will be distributed desk to desk to delegations.

#### PAST SESSIONS







48<sup>th</sup> session (2017): Adopted the global indicator framework for the Sustainable Development Goals and targets of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

<u>47<sup>th</sup> session (2016)</u>: Agreed, as a practical starting point, the **proposed global indicator framework** for the goals and targets of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

<u>46<sup>th</sup> session (2015)</u>: Established the Inter-Agency and Expert Group on Sustainable Development Goal Indicators (IAEG-SDGs). Launched the 2020 World Population and Housing Census Programme.

<u>44<sup>th</sup> session (2013)</u>: Endorsed the Framework for the Development of Environment Statistics (FDES). Established the Expert Group on the Integration of Statistical and Geospatial Information. Revised the Central Product Classification (CPC).

43<sup>rd</sup> session (2012): Adopted the **System of Environmental-Economic Accounting (SEEA)**.

<u>42<sup>nd</sup> session (2011)</u>: Adopted the **International Recommendations** for Energy Statistics (IRES).

41st session (2010): Endorsed the first World Statistics Day.

Adopted International Merchandise Trade Statistics methodology.

40<sup>th</sup> session (2009): Adopted the **System of National Accounts** 2008

<u>Special Session (1994)</u>: Adopted the **Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics**.

#### SECRETARIAT (UNSD)

The UNSD acts as **Secretariat** of the Commission and is committed to the advancement of the global statistical system. It compiles and disseminates global statistical information, develops standards and norms for statistical activities, and supports countries' efforts to strengthen their national statistical systems. UNSD facilitates the coordination of international statistical activities and supports the functioning of the United Nations Statistical Commission as the highest entity of the global statistical system.

#### Functions include:

- Data (collection, processing and dissemination of statistical information)
- Methodology (Standardization of statistical methods, classifications and definitions)
- Capacity Development (Technical cooperation programme)
- Coordination (coordination of international statistical programmes and activities)
