

•OVERVIEW•



The **United Nations Statistical Commission**, established in 1947, is the highest body of the global statistical system. It brings the chief statisticians of Member States together from around the world. It is the highest decision-making body for international statistical activities, notably the setting of statistical standards, the development of concepts and methods and their implementation at the national and international levels.

The Commission oversees the work of the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD) and is a functional commission of the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC).

During the session, delegates are encouraged to:

- · Actively contribute;
- Be brief and concise in oral interventions; and,
- Share national practices, report routine activities or detailed expositions of methodology in written form rather than orally. Such country notes will be presented on the Commission website.

Delegates also have a chance to meet statisticians from:

- National Statistical Offices;
- International Organizations; and
- The Secretariat (UNSD).

•MANDATES•

The terms of reference of the Commission state that it shall assist ECOSOC (ECOSOC resolutions 8 (I) of 16 February 1946; 8 (II) of 21 June 1946; and, 1566 (L) of 3 May 1971):

- a) In promoting the development of national statistics and the improvement of their comparability;
- b) In the coordination of the statistical work of specialised agencies;
- c) In the development of the central statistical services of the Secretariat;
- d) In advising the organs of the United Nations on general questions relating to the collection, analysis and dissemination of statistical information; and,
- e) In promoting the improvement of statistics and statistical methods generally.



On 6 July 2017, the General Assembly (resolution 71/313) adopted the global indicator framework for the Sustainable Development Goals and targets of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development developed by the Inter-Agency and Expert Group on Sustainable Development Goal

Indicators, as agreed upon by the Statistical Commission at its 48th session, as a voluntary and country-led instrument that includes the initial set of indicators to be refined annually and reviewed comprehensively by the Commission at its 51st and 56th sessions.


It also requested the Commission to coordinate the substantive and technical work to develop international statistical standards, methods and guidelines, where necessary, to fully implement the global indicator framework to follow up and review the Sustainable Development Goals and targets; and to further refine and improve the global indicator framework.

•MEMBERSHIP•

The Commission consists of 24 Member States of the United Nations elected by the ECOSOC to serve a term of four years based on an equitable geographical distribution as follows:

All other States are considered **Observers**, but the Commission traditionally treats Observer and United Nations Member States equally during its discussions. The **Chair**, **3 Vice-chairs** and the **Rapporteur** are the five officers of the Commission, known as the **Bureau**. The Bureau is elected for a one-year term with the expectation that they will serve for a further year if available. Nominations of these officers are made by the Commission with elections held at the beginning of the session. In practice, elections



AGENDA

The agenda is organised in the following sections:

- Opening;
- Election of officers for the year;
- Adoption of the agenda and timetable;
- Items for discussion and decision (Tuesday Thursday morning);
- Items for information (Thursday afternoon);
- UNSD programme questions (Friday morning);
- Provisional agenda and dates for next year's session; and,
- Report of the Commission on its fiftieth session

The adoption of the agenda is usually a routine matter; last-minute changes are unusual.



Items for discussion and for decision are the Commission to discuss and make decisions or take actions. The chair will mention the relevant report related to the item, the author will give an oral introduction, the chair will open the floor for discussion, and a summary will be made by the Secretariat (UNSD staff) after the discussion of each item.

Items for information refer to progress reports, which the Commission takes note of

usually without further debate. Information items are handled as a block. However, the Chair will offer the Commission the opportunity to identify information items for which clarifications or updates are needed.

DOCUMENTS

There are two types of documents related to the Commission:

- Official documents: Formally edited and available in the six official languages of the UN. They are subject to a strict word limit and submitted to the Secretariat in November. They carry a formal document reference. For example E/CN.3/2020/1 where E is for ECOSOC, CN.3 is identifying number for Statistical Commission, 2020 is the year, and 1 is the document number.
- Background documents: Accompanying a specific agenda item. The Secretariat does not formally edit background documents and therefore, do not have a word limit. Commonly, background documents are used to present substantive items for adoption/endorsement (such as Frameworks or Standards), whereas Offical Documents commonly provide a report for the agenda item. While they are typically available in English, Member States are encouraged to support their translation. Background documents become available at different times before the start of the Commission session.

All **official documents** will be available electronically both on the Commission website (https://unstats.un.org/unsd/statcom/51st-session/) and on the PaperSmart portal. They can be printed ondemand in the "Print Shop", located on floor 1B (by the escalator).

Copies of **background documents** may be available on side tables in the conference room.

Only the **draft report of the session** and any **draft resolutions** (if applicable) will be distributed desk to desk to delegations.

•PAST SESSIONS•







50th session (2019): Adopted the **United Nations National Quality Assurance Frameworks Manual for Official Statistics** and the recommendations contained therein.

<u>48th session (2017)</u>: Adopted the **Global Indicator Framework for the Sustainable Development Goals and targets** of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

<u>47th session (2016)</u>: Agreed, as a practical starting point, the **proposed Global Indicator Framework** for the goals and targets of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

<u>46th session (2015)</u>: Established the Inter-Agency and Expert Group on Sustainable Development Goal Indicators (IAEG-SDGs). Launched the 2020 World Population and Housing Census Programme.

<u>44th session (2013)</u>: Endorsed the Framework for the Development of Environment Statistics (FDES). Established the Expert Group on the Integration of Statistical and Geospatial Information. Revised the Central Product Classification (CPC).

<u>43rd session (2012)</u>: Adopted the **System of Environmental-Economic Accounting (SEEA)**.

<u>Special Session (1994)</u>: Adopted the **Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics**.

PAST CHAIRS

The UNSD acts as **Secretariat** of the Commission and is committed to the advancement of the global statistical system. It compiles and disseminates global statistical information, develops standards and norms for statistical activities, and supports countries' efforts to strengthen their national statistical systems. UNSD facilitates the coordination of international statistical activities and supports the functioning of the United Nations Statistical Commission as the highest entity of the global statistical system.

Functions include:

- Data (collection, processing and dissemination of statistical information);
- Methodology (Standardization of statistical methods, classifications and definitions);
- Capacity Development (Technical cooperation programme); and,
- Coordination (coordination of international statistical programmes and activities).

UNSD disseminates statistical data compilations and develops methodological publications:
