Context

A data strategy is a coherent plan for organizing, governing, analyzing, and deploying an organization's information assets^[1] towards the optimal use and reuse of data, in order to provide service and value to citizens.

A joint data strategy achieves the above but among like-minded partners to clarify roles and responsibilities, improve synergies, efficiencies and impacts of the partnership by systemizing joint activities in support of their respective mandates and strategic data priorities.

Who are we?

Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) is a department of the Government of Canada responsible for developing, managing and delivering social programs and services. ESDC's mandate is to build a stronger and more inclusive Canada, to support Canadians in helping them live productive and rewarding lives and improving Canadians' quality of life.

Statistics Canada (StatCan) is the national statistical office. The agency ensures Canadians have the key information on Canada's economy, society and environment that they require to function effectively as citizens and decision makers. Statistics Canada is legislated by the *Statistics Act* to serve the whole of Canada and each of the provinces and territories. In addition to conducting a census every 5 years, Statistics Canada manages over 350 active surveys on virtually all aspects of Canadian life.



Partnership / Relationship



ESDC and StatCan have an interdependent data partnership and relationship:

- ESDC is one of the largest consumers of StatCan data and stewards large amounts of administrative data to deliver programs to citizens.
- ESDC funds several Statistics Canada survey programs, transferring funds to invest in statistical products and services provided by the statistical agency.



Governance Structure

- The Joint Data Strategy **Governance Process builds on an existing governance structure** and is defined in our Terms of Reference:
 1. ESDC & StatCan Director General
 - Director General Strategic Coordination Committee
 2. Assistant Chief Statistician & Assistant Deputy Minister
 3. Deputy Minister & Chief Statistician

Collaboration occurs at every level, including through a joint strategy working group that engages with subject matter experts.



Background

In 2021, ESDC and StatCan agreed to enhance collaboration and adopt a more strategic approach by developing a sound joint data strategy framework.

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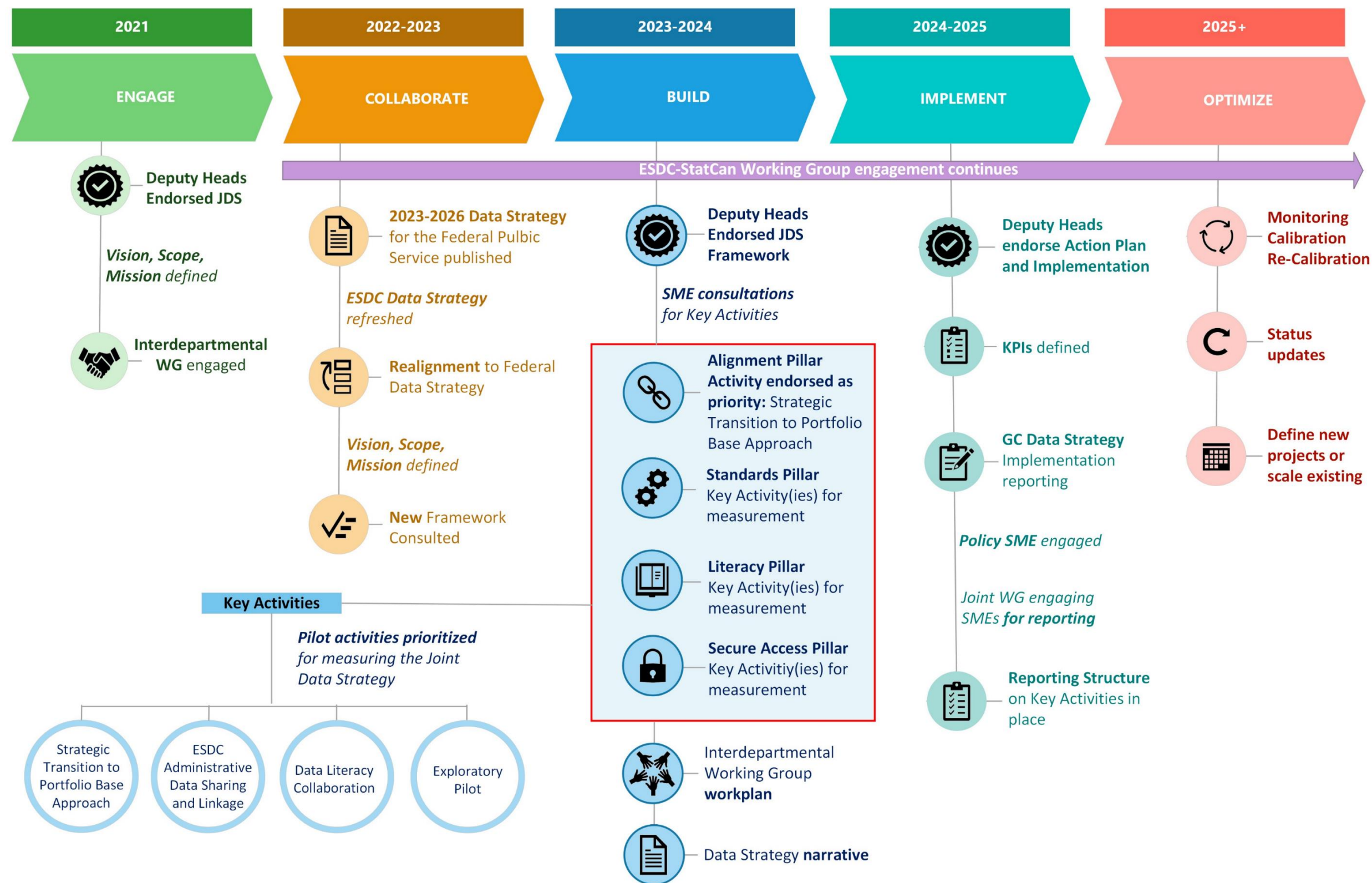


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ESDC-StatCan Joint Data Strategy Roadmap

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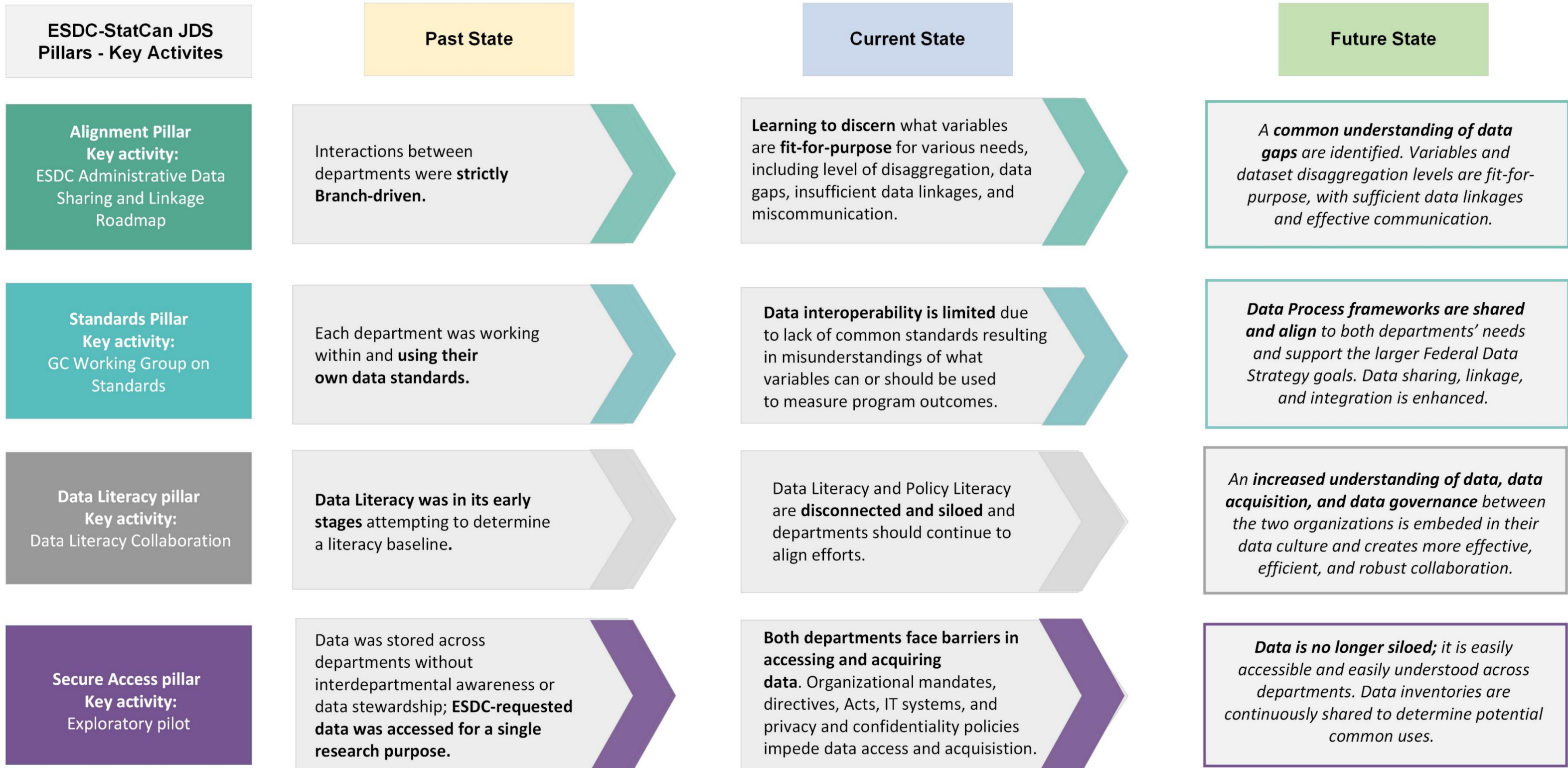


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Strategic journey towards a future state of the ESDC-StatCan JDS

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THEME: GAPS in data availabilities

- Consultation on data gaps, prioritize data needs, leverage multi-sources data availabilities

THEME: DISAGGREGATION of variables and data

- Targeted disaggregation and classification of variables to enable disaggregation on organizational mandates

THEME: LINKAGES of datasets

- Engage and identify opportunities for data integration to fill gaps

Increasing data access and acquisition helps frame further opportunities for alignment on key data gaps, linkages and need for further disaggregation

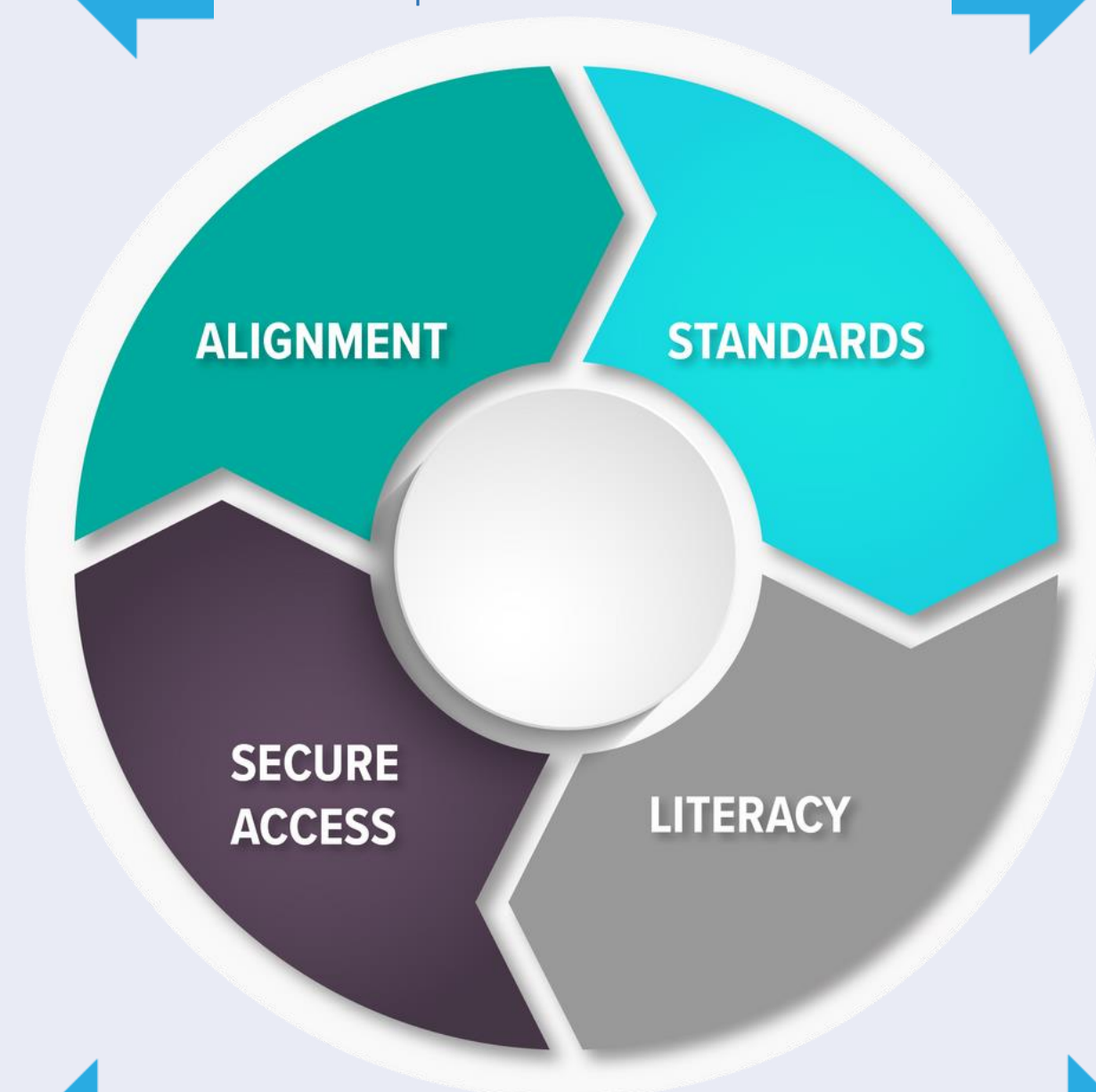
THEME: SIMPLIFY processes and timelines

- Simplify the processes for the data access and acquisition between departments through governance frameworks
- Larger-scale MOUs and LOAs through legal understanding

THEME: CURATE data fit for purpose

- Share each organization's data inventory and identify potential common use
- Review new data acquisition process for potential sharing opportunities

Increasing interdepartmental collaboration to identify opportunities for alignment leads to adoption of common standards



Enhancing interdepartmental literacy increases the opportunity to simplify and coordinate data access and acquisition for secure data stewardship

THEME: UPTAKE OF STANDARDS

- Common agreement on standards
- Increase uptake of common standards where viable
- Co-develop guidance for adoption

THEME: Shared FRAMEWORKS

- Align with frameworks being developed for the GC (e.g., Data Quality Framework)
- Review organizational frameworks to see where we can align

Enhanced standards uptake increases interoperability between departments and systems, fostering interdepartmental literacy and increased trust through governance (universal data formats)

THEME: CULTURE

- Share data literacy strategies
- Increase data literacy at ESDC for standards and Increase program awareness at StatCan for implementation

THEME: GOVERNANCE through Privacy, Legal, and Ethics

- Enhance understanding of data acquisition process between the two organizations, including terms of use (privacy, confidentiality, and need-to-know principles, etc.)

Goals of the Joint Data Strategy

The framework was endorsed by ESDC's Deputy Minister and StatCan's Chief Statistician

The activities under each pillar contribute to:

- ✓ **Working more effectively, collaboratively, and strategically**
- ✓ **Aligning common organizational needs and streamlining processes and goals**
- ✓ **Optimizing data access, data sharing, data interoperability through common standards and best practices**
- ✓ **Identifying opportunities for continuous improvement and uses of data that will benefit both organizations and Canadians**



Benefits of the ESDC-StatCan Joint Data Strategy

The benefits of a joint ESDC-StatCan Data Strategy (high level, medium to long term):

- Reduce duplication of data collection, processing, and storage
- Provide more timely release of statistical output
- Demonstrate leadership on data use and re-use
- Drive data interoperability in the Government of Canada
- Provide better services to Canadians

How?

- Prioritize organizational needs to ensure interdepartmental alignment
- Inform employees on how to leverage the Strategy to work more effectively with data
- Incorporate alternative, cost-effective methods, such as data linkage projects
- Communicate progress to partners, reinforce our leadership in collaboration



ESDC-StatCan JDS Consultations

Consultations were held for each pillar with identified key contacts and experts from ESDC and StatCan.

Pillar	Purpose	Expected outcomes
Alignment	Identify common data needs and gaps and leverage multi-sources data availabilities	Enhanced collaboration, operational efficiency, and quality service to citizens
Standards	Advance the use common standards and frameworks	Increased data interoperability for higher quality analysis, decision and policy making
Data Literacy	Ensure data-users are equipped with the right skills and knowledge for data-use	Increased understanding of data, security and privacy, improving data maturity
Secure Access	Simplify and streamline data access processes between departments	Data that are easily accessible and shareable (can be used and reused) effectively through systems, platforms, with the right guardrails in place to ensure data security



Results of the Joint Data Strategy

Milestones

- **Documentation:** Framework and Roadmap endorsement
- **Consultation:** Alignment, Standards, and Literacy Pillars complete
- **Communication:** Multiple joint interdepartmental presentations

Outcomes

- ESDC has shared 13 administrative files with StatCan, available in the Research Data Centres (RDC) across Canada
- Over 60 policy, analysis, research and evaluation projects have used data derived from ESDC-StatCan **data linkages** this year
- An Exploratory Pilot enabling researchers to more quickly identify and **gain faster access to available data**
- ESDC and StatCan are **actively collaborating** on the Government of Canada's **Data Standards** Working Group, aligning their efforts with national policies.
- ESDC and StatCan are **sharing data literacy strategies**, contributing to higher quality literacy strategies for both organizations.



Lessons Learned

- High-level endorsement is vital
- A Terms of Reference substantiates guidelines
- Consult with subject matter experts regularly
- A Joint Data Strategy should be subject matter agnostic
- Communication is essential
- *A Strategy is not just a document. It is a living, breathing process that is agile*
